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# CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT REQUIREMENTS

The California Regional Water Quality Control Board, Los Angeles Region (hereinafter referred to as the Regional Board) is the Lead Agency for evaluating the environmental impacts of the proposed amendment to the *Water Quality Control Plan for the Los Angeles Region (Basin Plan)*. The proposed amendments revise the chloride objectives for waters at Santa Paula in the Santa Clara River. The Secretary of Resources has certified the basin planning process as exempt from certain requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), including preparation of an initial study, negative declaration, and environmental impact report (California Code of Regulations, title 14, § 15251(g)). As the proposed amendment to the *Basin Plan* is part of the basin planning process, the environmental information developed for and included with the amendment is considered functionally equivalent to an initial study, negative declaration, and/or environmental impact report.

Any regulatory program of the Regional Board certified as functionally equivalent, however, must satisfy the documentation requirements of California Code of Regulations, title 23, section 3777(a) which requires the following:

- A written report providing:
  - a description of the proposed activity;
  - reasonable alternatives to the proposed activity; and
  - mitigation measures to minimize any significant adverse impacts.
- A completed environmental checklist that includes:
  - a checklist of environmental impacts;
  - a discussion of the environmental evaluation; and
  - a determination with respect to significant environmental impacts.

The attached checklist and Staff Report fulfill the requirements of section 3777, subdivision (a).

### I. Description of Proposed Activity

The current Basin Plan objectives for chloride for waters of Reach 3 in the Santa Clara River are those originally set forth in the 1978 Water Quality Control Plans for the Santa Clara River Basin and Los Angeles River Basin (1978 Basin Plans). These objectives were based on the results of in-stream sampling and technical studies conducted in the late 1920s and the 1950s through 1970s. Between 1998 and 2000, Board staff completed a recommendation to modify the water quality objective from its current value of 80 mg/L to 100 mg/L based upon the collection of 25 additional years of sampling and an assessment of the beneficial use requirements. Further, the U.S. EPA completed a Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) for chloride in this reach which re-evaluate the sources and beneficial use requirements and anticipates the modification of the WQO and new waste load allocations. Finally, in 2002, Board staff evaluated the data used for the 2002 303(d) list preparation and determined that the data resulting in the retention of the chloride listing for Reach 3 resulted from effluent flowing in the river channel before blending with receiving water. A plant serving the cities of Santa Paula and Fillmore is replacing the waste treatment plant responsible for this problem. The new and larger plant will include an improved outfall design that should ensure compliance with the standard.

Answer: Yes

A change in the quality of surface water will occur when discharge is adjusted to meet the new objectives.

Currently and for many years, the lower Santa Clara River has contained chloride concentrations of approximately 100 mg/L level. This water quality has been shown to protect the most sensitive beneficial uses of the Santa Clara River, including agricultural supply for salt sensitive crops such as avacado and strawberry production. This amendment will result in a water quality objective that is consistent with the chloride objective in the Upper Santa Clara River and will result in water quality standards that continue to be protective of all beneficial uses and which will enhance recreational beneficial uses in the Santa Paula region. Therefore, these impacts to the environment are negligible.
