BY THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER:

1. On June 2, 2014, the US Department of Interior Bureau of Land Management, Jennifer Mata (Applicant) filed an application for water quality certification (certification) under section 401 of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. § 1341) with the California Regional Water Quality Control Board, North Coast Region (Regional Water Board) for activities associated with the Lower East Weaver Creek Improvement Project (Project). Information describing the Project was noticed for public comment on the Regional Water Board's website on July 17, 2014. We received no comments. The proposed Project will cause disturbances to waters of the United States and State associated with the Trinity River Hydrologic Unit No. 106.32. The Project is located on Lower East Weaver Creek just upstream of the confluence with West Weaver Creek, Weaverville, Trinity County, at latitude 40.7220667°N, and longitude 122.9391722°W. The Project will result in permanent impacts to approximately 476

linear feet of creek bed and bank. Temporary impacts to waters of the U.S. and State are not proposed.

2. The Project will stabilize the creek bed and bank to protect an existing sewer line currently running under East Weaver Creek and enhance salmonid habitat along this reach through the installation of bioengineering designs and large wood debris (LWD). The Project includes working in the creek bed and bank during the dry months, stabilizing a 100-foot section of the creek bed and bank at the sewer pipe location, relocating the pipe riser away from the creek. Creek stabilization material will consist of rock and live willow cutting embankments (bioengineering) to provide shade and roughness to the bank. Grade control structures will consist of log groin structures. Habitat enhancement and creek stabilization structures will consist of rock and LWD structures to create habitat complexity, bank stability and a low flow channel.
3. The Project includes a plan to revegetate disturbed areas, including planting native willows and pines within the riparian area. The addition of LWD structures will enhance salmonid habitat increasing creek function along the reach. The Project description and restoration plan includes monitoring and reporting to ensure success criteria are met for habitat improvement, channel morphology, and revegetation. The Project proposes to employ best management practices to prevent or reduce any discharges during and after construction. Best management practices for sediment and turbidity control, operation of heavy equipment near a river, as well as aquatic species and habit protection, are proposed to avoid and minimize temporary impacts.
4. The Project is planned to take place from summer to fall of 2014, with construction planned to occur for approximately 60 days.
5. The Applicant has obtained authorization from the United States Army Corps of Engineers for a Clean Water Act, section 404 (Nationwide Permit No. 12, File No. 2014-00197). The Applicant has consulted with to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife and a Streambed Alteration Agreement is not necessary as the project is on federal land.
6. The North Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board, as Responsible California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) agency, has determined that the project qualifies for a Categorical Exemption, 15301 (b)(d) Existing Facilities, and will file a Notice of Exemption with the State Clearinghouse concurrent with issuance of the 401 Water Quality Certification, pursuant to CEQA guidelines.
7. The Trinity River Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) for sediment was established in 2001 by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in accordance with section 303(d) of the Clean Water Act, because the State of California determined that the water quality standards for the Trinity River are exceeded due to excessive

sediment. Roads and bank erosion are identified as sources contributing to the sediment impairment. The primary adverse impacts associated with excessive sediment in the Trinity River pertain to cold freshwater habitat, primarily anadromous salmonid habitat. Proposed activities include implementation of BMPs for sediment and erosion control, and implementation of wetland and riparian mitigation measures as described above. Accordingly, the project is consistent with, and implements portions of the Trinity River TMDL.

8. Pursuant to Regional Water Board Resolution R1-2004-0087, Total Maximum Daily Load Implementation Policy Statement for Sediment-Impaired Receiving Waters within the North Coast Region (Sediment TMDL Implementation Policy), the Executive Officer is directed to "rely on the use of all available authorities, including existing regulatory standards, and permitting and enforcement tools to more effectively and efficaciously pursue compliance with sediment-related standards by all dischargers of sediment waste."
9. The federal antidegradation policy requires that state water quality standards include an antidegradation policy consistent with the federal policy. The State Water Board established California's antidegradation policy in State Water Board Resolution No. 68-16. Resolution No. 68-16 incorporates the federal antidegradation policy where the federal policy applies under federal law. Resolution No. 68-16 requires that existing quality of waters be maintained unless degradation is justified based on specific findings. The Regional Water Board's Basin Plan implements, and incorporates by reference, both the State and federal antidegradation policies. This Order is consistent with applicable federal and State antidegradation policies, as it does not authorize the discharge of increased concentrations of pollutants or increased volumes of treated wastewater.
10. This discharge is also regulated under State Water Resources Control Board Order No. 2003-0017-DWQ, "General Waste Discharge Requirements for Dredge and Fill Discharges That Have Received State Water Quality Certification," which requires compliance with all conditions of this water quality certification. Accordingly, based on its independent review of the record, the Regional Water Board certifies that the Lower East Weaver Habitat Improvement Project (WDID No. 1A14054WNTR), as described in the application, will comply with sections 301, 302, 303, 306 and 307 of the Clean Water Act, and with applicable provisions of state law, provided that the Applicant complies with the following terms and conditions:

All conditions of this order apply to the Applicant (and all their employees) and all contractors (and their employees), sub-contractors (and their employees), and any other entity or agency that performs activities or work on the project as related to this Water Quality Certification.

1. This certification action is subject to modification or revocation upon administrative or judicial review, including review and amendment pursuant to Water Code section 13330 and title 23, California Code of Regulations, section 3867.
2. This certification action is not intended and shall not be construed to apply to any discharge from any activity involving a hydroelectric facility requiring a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) license or an amendment to a FERC license unless the pertinent certification application was filed pursuant to title 23, California Code of Regulations, section 3855, subdivision (b) and the application specifically identified that a FERC license or amendment to a FERC license for a hydroelectric facility was being sought.
3. The validity of this certification is conditioned upon total payment of any fee required under title 23, California Code of Regulations, section 3833, and owed by the Applicant.
4. The Project restoration plan includes monitoring and reporting to ensure success criteria are met for habitat improvement channel morphology and vegetation. The Project restoration and revegetation shall be implemented in accordance with the *Lower East Weaver Habitat Improvement Project Restoration and Monitoring Plan* submitted July 21, 2013, by the Five Counties Salmonid Conservation Program on behalf of the Applicant. The Project includes a plan to revegetate disturbed areas, including planting native willows and pines within the riparian area. The addition of LWD structures will enhance salmonid habitat increasing creek function along the reach. The Project restoration plan includes monitoring and reporting to ensure success criteria are met for habitat improvement channel morphology and vegetation.

Results of annual monitoring of the mitigation areas will be reported to the Regional Water Board annually. Reports shall summarize data collected, annual performance, any remedial action necessary and whether success criteria are met.

5. Applicant shall prioritize the use of wildlife-friendly 100% biodegradable erosion control products/BMPs whenever feasible. For purposes of this Order, photodegradable synthetic products are not considered biodegradable. Applicant shall not use or allow the use of erosion control products that contain synthetic (e.g., plastic or nylon) netting or materials for permanent erosion control (i.e., erosion control materials to be left in place for two years or after the completion date of the Project). If the Applicant finds that erosion control netting or products have entrapped or harmed wildlife, the Applicant shall remove the netting or product and replace it with wildlife-friendly biodegradable products. Applicant shall remove any remaining synthetic netting or materials remaining at the end of two years, or sooner.
6. BMPs shall be implemented as proposed in the application materials. BMPs for erosion, sediment and turbidity control shall be implemented and in place at commencement of, during and after any ground clearing activities or any other Project activities that could result in erosion or sediment discharges to surface water. Severe and unseasonal rain events are becoming more frequent due to the effects of climate change. Therefore, BMPs shall be immediately available for deployment at all times to prevent discharges to waters of the state.
7. No debris, soil, silt, sand, bark, slash, sawdust, rubbish, cement or concrete washings, oil or petroleum products, or other organic or earthen material from any construction or associated activity of whatever nature, other than that authorized by this Order, shall be allowed to enter into or be placed where it may be washed by rainfall into waters of the State. When operations are completed, any excess material or debris shall be removed from the work area.
8. The Applicant shall provide Regional Water Board staff access to the Project site to document compliance with this certification.
9. If, at any time, an unauthorized discharge to surface water (including wetlands, lakes, rivers or streams) occurs, or any water quality problem arises, the associated Project activities shall cease immediately until adequate BMPs are implemented including stopping work. The Regional Water Board shall be notified promptly and in no case more than 24 hours after the unauthorized discharge or water quality problem arises.
10. Prior to implementing any change to the Project that may have a significant or material effect on the findings, conclusions, or conditions of this Order, the Applicant shall obtain the written approval of the Regional Water Board Executive Officer. If the Regional Water Board is not notified of a significant alteration to the Project, it will be considered a violation of this Order, and the Applicant may be subject to Regional Water Board enforcement action(s).
11. All Project work shall be conducted as described in this Order and in the application submitted by the Applicant, and shall comply with all applicable water quality

standards as detailed in the Basin Plan. If the Regional Water Board is not notified of a significant alteration to the Project, it will be considered a violation of this Order, and the Applicant may be subject to Regional Water Board enforcement actions.

12. The Applicant shall provide a copy of this Order and State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) Order No. 2003-0017-DWQ to any contractor(s), subcontractor(s), and utility company(ies) conducting work on the Project, and shall require that copies remain in their possession at the work site. The Applicant shall be responsible for ensuring that all work conducted by its contractor(s), subcontractor(s), and utility companies is performed in accordance with the information provided by the Applicant to the Regional Water Board.
13. Disturbance or removal of existing vegetation shall not exceed the minimum necessary to complete the Project.
14. Fueling, lubrication, maintenance, storage, and staging of vehicles and equipment shall not result in a discharge or threatened discharge to any waters of the State including dry portions of the shoreline. At no time shall the Applicant or its contractors allow use of any vehicle or equipment, which leaks any substance that may impact water quality.
15. The Regional Water Board may add to or modify the conditions of this Order, as appropriate, to implement any new or revised water quality standards and implementation plans adopted and approved pursuant to the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act or section 303 of the Clean Water Act.
16. In the event of any violation or threatened violation of the conditions of this Order, the violation or threatened violation shall be subject to any remedies, penalties, process or sanctions as provided for under applicable state or federal law. For the purposes of section 401(d) of the Clean Water Act, the applicability of any state law authorizing remedies, penalties, process or sanctions for the violation or threatened violation constitutes a limitation necessary to assure compliance with the water quality standards and other pertinent requirements incorporated into this Order. In response to a suspected violation of any condition of this certification, the State Water Board may require the holder of any federal permit or license subject to this Order to furnish, under penalty of perjury, any technical or monitoring reports the State Water Board deems appropriate, provided that the burden, including costs, of the reports shall bear a reasonable relationship to the need for the reports and the benefits to be obtained from the reports. In response to any violation of the conditions of this Order, the Regional Water Board may add to or modify the conditions of this Order as appropriate to ensure compliance.
17. In the event of any change in control of ownership of land presently owned or controlled by the Applicant, the Applicant shall notify the successor-in-interest of the

existence of this Order by letter and shall email a copy of the letter to the following email address: NorthCoast@waterboards.ca.gov

To discharge dredged or fill material under this Order, the successor-in-interest must email the Regional Water Board Executive Officer at: NorthCoast@waterboards.ca.gov a written request for transfer of the Order. The request must contain the requesting entity's full legal name, the state of incorporation if a corporation, and the address and telephone number of the person(s) responsible for contact with the Regional Water Board.

The request must also describe any changes to the Project proposed by the successor-in-interest or confirm that the successor-in-interest intends to implement the Project as described in this Order. Except as may be modified by any preceding conditions, all certification actions are contingent on: a) the discharge being limited to and all proposed mitigation being completed in strict compliance with the Applicant's Project description, and b) compliance with all applicable requirements of the Water Quality Control Plan for the North Coast Region (Basin Plan).

18. The authorization of this certification for any dredge and fill activities expires on August 8, 2019. Conditions and monitoring requirements outlined in this Order are not subject to the expiration date outlined above, and remain in full effect and are enforceable.
