Summary:

- (1) The Berkeley Municipal Code is the City's legal authority establishing any discharge in violation of the NPDES permit and failure to comply with NPDES requirements as unlawful.
- (2) Developers are required to submit C.3/C.6 Stormwater Requirement Checklist as part of their zoning application. Interdepartmental roundtable meetings (with developers) and permit review process are additional avenues for ensuring C.3 compliance.
- (3) CEQA compliance documents are prepared to address environmental effects associated with new and redevelopment projects. Analysis is prepared on potential impacts by examining a variety of environmental issues such as air quality, noise, and hydrology and water quality. Mitigation measures are required for those issues deemed to have potential for significant impacts to the environment.
- (4) Staff attended on-site field trainings on green streets in Union City on May 10, 2016, as part of the Alameda County Clean Water Program New Development Subcommittee. Training covered both completed projects and projects during construction.
- (5) Outreach efforts included distributing Stormwater Requirement Checklist (updated for MRP 2.0) to staff and making an updated outreach flyer available for developers, builders, project applicants at the Building Department permit service center lobby.
- (6) For non C.3 Regulated Projects site design measures are encouraged through the use of a stormwater requirement checklist created specifically for non-regulated projects and is distributed to proponents of unregulated projects.
- (7) For non C.3 Regulated Projects source control measures are encouraged through the use of a stormwater requirement checklist created specifically for non-regulated projects and is distributed to proponents of unregulated projects.
- (8) Revisions to City of Berkeley's General Plan are not required at this time. The Environmental Management Element of the General Plan ensures a more environmentally sustainable community. Objectives and policies in the Plan include restoring and managing creeks and watersheds, promoting water conservation, and improving local groundwater quality.

- City Council Public meetings held in October and December 2015 and March 2016 included discussion of Measure M funded Green Infrastructure projects.
- On October 13, 2015, Berkeley hosted the Alameda County Clean Water Program New Development Subcommittee and provided a tour of two local Green Infrastructure projects, the Allston Permeable Pavement Pilot Project and Presentation Park bio-swale.

See Section C.4 – Industrial and Commercial Site Control – of the ACCWP FY 15-16 Annual Report for a summary of Program activities. City of Berkeley staff attended Industrial and Illicit Discharge Control (I&IDC) Subcommittee meetings in FY 15-16.

In FY 15-16 Industrial and Commercial facility inspections were performed by the Toxic Management Division (TMD) of the Planning Department and the Environmental Health Division (EH) of the Department of Health, Housing and Community Development. EH conducted inspections of Berkeley’s Food Service and Restaurant businesses, including mobile food services. TMD inspected primarily industrial and commercial businesses that handled threshold (Berkeley Municipal Code Title 15) amounts of hazardous materials.

TMD conducted 220 inspections at 203 regulated Industrial/commercial facilities in FY 15-16. TMD maintained an inventory of 392 Industrial businesses in the I&IDC inspection program that could reasonably be considered to impact stormwater pollution. EH conducted 130 inspections at food service and restaurant businesses in FY 15-16, which is lower than anticipated due to staff shortages. EH maintains an inventory of 777 food service and restaurant businesses.

TMD’s commercial/industrial facility inspections identified one discharge violation, and 11 potential discharge violations. All 12 facilities received written enforcement notices from TMD. EH identified one discharge violation, which received a written enforcement notice. All violations were resolved in a timely manner, except for one facility that closed before providing confirmation of correction (however the closure subsequently remedied the violation).

Introduction: The above project proposes to use non-LID treatment on a portion of the building roof, the guest parking and rear alley areas of the site to meet the C.3 stormwater treatment requirements as provided for in the Alameda County C.3 Technical Guidance Handbook.

The project qualifies as a special project under Category C – Transit-Oriented Development – of Appendix K of the Alameda County C.3 Technical Guidance Handbook. Based on the Special Projects Worksheet, the project is allowed a 50% LID Treatment Reduction Credit for being located within ¼ mile of a transit hub and an additional 30% LID Treatment Reduction Credit for having a dwelling unit per acre ratio greater than 100 dwelling units per acre, for a total allowable reduction credit of 80%. This project proposes to treat approximately 42% of the site with non-LID treatment, specifically a media filter unit, and the remaining 58% with LID treatment, specifically bio-retention flow-through planters and self-treating landscape areas.

On-Site LID Treatment: The project proposes to capture all runoff from the majority of the building roof by capturing the runoff and routing the runoff to three flow-through planters located at ground level.

Runoff from the east corner of the building roof, courtyard guest parking area, the building entry walkway and the access alleyway on the west side of the site are proposed to be treated with a Contech Model MHSF48 media filter unit located in the alleyway on the south side of the lot.

Based on the number of required guest parking spaces and grading requirements it is not possible to place an at grade bio-retention area capable of treating the required C.3 amount of runoff. Additionally, site grading constraints would prevent the parking area to be graded to collect runoff at a bio-retention area.

Pervious paving was considered for use in these areas. However, a review of the soils report by Rockridge Geotechnical, dated April 05, 2013, indicates that in test borings groundwater was encountered at depths of between 3.8 and 15 feet below grade. Chapter 6.6 of the Alameda County C.3 Handbook dealing with pervious paving indicates that the “depth to seasonal groundwater should be at least 5 feet from bottom of base” making pervious paving infeasible for these areas.

Off-Site LID Treatment: No regional projects are available to provide alternate compliance as described in Chapter 9 of Alameda County C.3 Handbook. The use of Off-Site LID treatment for this project is not feasible.

Combination On-Site & Off-Site LID Treatment: Because no regional projects are available to provide alternate (Off-Site) compliance, Combination on-site & off-site LID treatment for this project is infeasible.

Based on the reasons described above, Lea & Braze Engineering, Inc. feels that LID treatment of runoff from the east corner of the building roof, courtyard guest parking area, the building entry walkway and the access alleyway on the west side of the site is infeasible.

Using a media filter to treat these areas is appropriate for the design, falls within the limit of allowable LID Reduction Treatment Credit allowed for the project and meets the requirements of both the Alameda County C.3 Stormwater Treatment Handbook and the City of Berkeley drainage design requirements.

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Narrative Discussion for Infeasibility of 100% LID

3100 San Pablo Avenue (Marchant Building)

1. On-site 100% LID Treatment

The project is divided into eight drainage management areas. Where possible (five of the eight drainage management areas) runoff is directed to self-retaining or bioretention areas. The existing building footprint takes up 98% of the 177,455 square feet parcel, leaving roughly 3,000 square feet in the front of the building along San Pablo Avenue, where the self-retaining areas are located, and less than 1,000 square feet at the rear. With little available rear space a licensing agreement was established with the City of Berkeley, as owner of the adjacent rear property, to locate a bioretention system to treat water both from the project site and City owned site.

The project proposed is mostly interior work and does not impact the building footprint. The front portion of the building is 3 and 4 stories high cutting off and limiting the possibility in draining the rear portion (2 story high and roughly 140,000 square feet of the building) towards the front. The current building drainage primarily drains towards the rear with no storm drain system leading from front to rear. The length of the building from front to rear is roughly 770 feet creating a difficult situation in routing water back to the rear due to the depth of existing pipe connections. With these numbers, attempting to create the necessary area to place 100% LID treatment onsite would be infeasible. Therefore a tree well filter provides treatment for the front portion of the building. Another tree well filter is installed to treat a portion of the rear due to the finite space available from the City owned site for the bioretention system. Together these filters treat areas that are within the percentage for non-LID treatment as allowed by the Special Project status.

2. Off-site 100% LID Treatment

There is no offsite location in the same watershed where the property owner can install LID measures to treat 100% of the amount of runoff required for this project. LID treatment is located on the adjacent City owned site treating runoff from both the City site and the project site. The City site, however, is not large enough such that treating runoff from this site alone is equivalent to treating 100% of the amount of runoff required for the project site. In addition paying in-lieu fees are infeasible due to lack of a sufficiently sized offsite location or Regional Project.

3. Combination of On-site and Off-site 100% LID Treatment

There are no Regional Projects available to allow for payment of in-lieu fees. In addition the property owner does not own an offsite location in the same watershed where LID treatment is feasible.

Located adjacent to the rear of the project site is City owned land where a limited amount of pervious space is available for a bioretention system treating a portion of the required runoff from the project site. In return for allowing the use of this rear site, the City requires the bioretention area to also treat a portion of the runoff from the City owned site. Due to the size of the city owned site LID treatment of the entire city site combined with LID treatment of the feasible portion of the project site does not equate to the treating 100% of the amount of runoff required for the project site. Therefore, non-LID measures are used to treat the remaining portion.

Narrative Discussion for Alternative Compliance

Project Name: Marchant Building, 3100 San Pablo Avenue

Adjacent City of Berkeley and City of Emeryville owned properties are being used to locate bioretention areas to treat the remaining C.3.d.i.(2).c flow that could not be treated onsite. The city properties are not Regulated Projects and there is no construction activity other than to install the bioretention areas. The properties do not contain structures and have no addresses. These properties provide bicycle and pedestrian access between 67th Street in Emeryville and Folger Avenue in Berkeley. The bioretention areas are located on the east of the concrete path and west of the project site. The bioretention areas are sized to treat both runoff from the project site and from the concrete path. Below is information on each of the adjacent properties per C.3.b.iv(2)(m)(i):



In accordance with the San Francisco Bay Region Municipal Regional Stormwater NPDES Permit (MRP 2.0), Provision 10.a.i, Permittees, like the City of Berkeley (the City), are required to reduce their trash discharges from 2009 levels to receiving waters in accordance with the below deadlines.

- 70 percent by July 1, 2017
- 80 percent by July 1, 2019

In addition, Permittees are encouraged to achieve a 60 percent reduction by July 1, 2016, however this is not a mandatory deadline. Permittees that do not meet this 60 percent reduction goal are required to submit a plan and schedule for the implementation of additional trash load reduction control actions that will attain the July 1, 2017 deadline in their Stormwater Annual Report for the fiscal year 2015-2016. The City has not met the 60 percent reduction goal, and consequently is submitting this Trash Load Reduction Plan.

Currently there are a total of 196 full trash capture devices (FTCDs) installed at drain inlets throughout the City. These FTCDs treat 765 acres, and account for 24.4% trash reduction. There are several low impact development (LID) facilities located throughout the City, though most have not yet been retrofitted to serve for trash capture or are not big enough to make a significant impact on trash reduction.

For the fiscal year 2015-2016, Berkeley claims an 8% source control reduction for the single-use plastic bag and the expanded polystyrene food service ware ordinances, per the recommendations of the Alameda County Clean Water Program. Additionally, the City is receiving a 5.7% trash reduction offset for removing 5.51 tons of trash from Codornices Creek during two clean-up events during the fiscal year 2015-2016. The City anticipates that additional source control actions and creek clean-ups will take place in the future which will provide additional trash reduction credits.

Taking into account FTCDs, source control reduction, and creek clean-up reduction, the City currently has a total trash reduction of 38.1% for the fiscal year 2015-2016. For simplification and in order to avoid bidding out this work twice, the City is planning to meet the 80% trash reduction requirement early, by July 1, 2017. In order to do this, the City has calculated that an additional 259 FTCDs need to be installed.

The City anticipates that installing 259 FTCDs will cost approximately \$182,000 and will increase our yearly maintenance costs by about \$43,000. On June 30, 2015, the Berkeley City Council adopted the 2016-2017 Capital Improvement Program and allocated \$11,199,303 to provide funding for streets improvements. A portion of the 2017 Street Improvement budget will be used for funding the installation of FTCDs. Ongoing maintenance of the FTCDs will be funded through the City's Clean Stormwater Fund on an annual basis.

Below is the City's anticipated schedule for installing the FTCDs.

- Plans and specifications complete (October 2016)
- Advertise contract (early November 2016)
- Open bids (late November 2016)
- City Council Approval (January 2017)
- Award Contract (February 2017)
- Execute Contract (March 2017)
- Work Begins (April 2017)
- Work Completed (June 2017)
