Responses to Comments from the Citizens of Fig Street

- 38-1. The commenter is concerned that the land application of biosolids will result in public health problems. The impacts associated with the potential for aerial dispersion of biosolids derived particles is discussed on pages 5-35 and 5-36 of the draft EIR. The draft EIR concluded that the land application of biosolids would not result in public health problems if applied and managed under the terms of the GO. Since the publication of the draft EIR, additional protective measures have been added to the GO for air quality (specifically to address the potential for wind blown soil containing biosolids). See Master Response 9 for a description of these measures.
