1.0 INTRODUCTION

The California Department of Water Resources (DWR) conducted a statewide environmental justice survey from July to November 2009 in coordination with the development of the Bay Delta Conservation Plan (BDCP) and environmental review of the BDCP. The survey results and the following report is a part of an ongoing effort to fully comply with Presidential Executive Order (EO) 12898, Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice (EJ) in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations.

1.1 Purpose

Throughout the process of developing the BDCP and environmental analysis, it has been recognized that some elements of the proposed water conveyance and habitat restoration activities may result in disproportionate impacts to some minority and low-income¹ populations, including California Native American tribes, in and throughout the Sacramento River and San Joaquin River Delta (Delta). To ensure that these potential impacts on minority and low-income populations are represented in the BDCP's planning and decision-making process, this survey was conducted to help better understand the environmental justice issues related to the BDCP.

The survey's intent was to identify possible environmental justice issues related to the BDCP and required environmental review process with the goal of providing the raw data results to the environmental review team for incorporation into the Environmental Impact Report (EIR)/Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) analysis. The survey results are also meant to help the community outreach team gather information regarding environmental justice communities and stakeholders in order to adequately plan for community outreach activities and education efforts moving forward.

As such, one of the major goals of the survey was to identify potential issues of concern that should be considered as part of the environmental review of the BDCP, especially as they relate to environmental justice stakeholders. The survey was designed to identify potential disproportionate impacts to low-income and ethnic² communities (both English and non-English speaking residents) and identify appropriate means to communicate BDCP-related issues with these audiences.

Further, it was thought that by identifying potential issues of concern to these target populations, additional information could be gathered to (1) help address these concerns prior to any action being taken by state and federal agencies, and (2) help address or mitigate long-term potential impacts derived from potential BDCP actions.

Key information related to audiences that are typically hard-to-reach (e.g. rural, agricultural, or low-income groups) was obtained, both with the goal of aiding in the environmental review process, and for the purposes of identifying appropriate long-term outreach

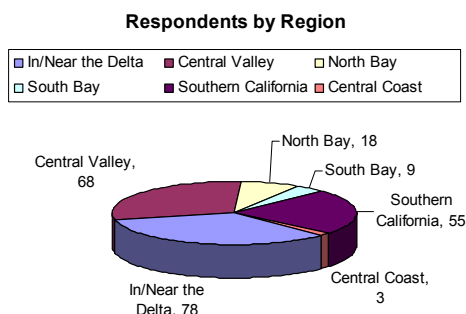

methodologies for future use by the community outreach team. California Native American tribes were not included in this survey due to ongoing efforts at the state and federal levels to engage Tribal Councils on a government-to-government basis. However, tribes are recognized as important to the community involvement process and will be consulted regarding the BDCP through a separate effort.

The community outreach team, which includes staff from the state and federal agencies involved in the BDCP, as well as legal counsel and consultants, identified more than 1,400 individuals throughout the state to participate in the survey. Individuals were asked to take part in a brief telephone survey and offer insight and feedback to questions that were predetermined by the community outreach team dealing with various issues in the Delta, and related to water supply, quality, and conveyance throughout the state.

1.2 Participant Identification

A database was developed to serve as the foundation for identifying the target survey participants. Included in the database were a number of key environmental justice stakeholders, including public interest associations, ethnic associations, local governments and interested community members and activists. Efforts were made to ensure that the database included a broad cross-section of potentially impacted minority and low-income



stakeholders so that the responses represented as broad a view as possible. A sample of 1,400 stakeholders were identified as potential survey participants. Of the 1,400 survey invitations sent to identified stakeholders, 260 respondents agreed to participate in a 30-minute telephone survey. This response represents a 19 percent return. Due to scheduling conflicts and other issues, 231 of the 260 respondents who originally agreed to participate were interviewed.

The 231 survey respondents represent the environmental justice stakeholders based upon their status as community leaders, and/or their direct involvement and/or access to information about low-income and ethnic communities. Survey questions were designed to solicit unique insights into underserved communities; of particular interest was the way in which area residents use the Delta.

To clearly define concerns expressed by those interviewed, six categories of participants were identified. Each respondent was assigned to one of the following categories:

- Agriculture: Representatives from farm bureaus throughout the state.
- Business: Business owners, chambers of commerce, economic development, and employment organizations.
- Community or Faith-based: Non-profit organizations and foundations, government-funded assistance programs, school districts and churches/places of worship.

- Ethnic³: Organizations specializing in outreach to minority communities.
- Government or Elected officials: Government employees, local and statewide elected officials.
- Public Interest or Environmental: Water districts, environmental advocacy groups.

1.3 Methodology

Telephone interviews were conducted by professional community outreach consultants. A questionnaire was used to guide discussions with interviewees; however, respondents were encouraged to explore additional non-scripted related topics that arose during the exchange of dialogue in order to examine other areas of interest not accounted for in the survey questions.

1.4 Method Limitations

Like other qualitative methods, these interviews allow for a detailed exploration of various key topics, but do not provide data that is statistically representative of a larger population. For example, in some instances only one respondent "type" was reached in any given geographic region and information was gathered and analyzed. However, it should not be assumed that this one individual offers adequate representation of all other potential respondents categorized in the same "type" (i.e., agricultural).

It should also be noted that this report makes note of trends among interview participants when applicable, but those trends in many cases have been generalized and cannot be applied as a standard to an entire population. Instead, the information obtained through these interviews is considered descriptive and informative only, and should be considered as representative of the wide range of opinions that may exist among communities throughout California.

1.5 Process

Two individual rounds of interviews were conducted. Community representatives for the first round of interviews were identified based on the percentage of low-income and/or ethnic residents in their respective community and the community's proximity to the Delta. The first round of interviews included key stakeholders in communities in/near the Delta, Central Valley, and North Bay.

The geographical regions represented by the areas defined as In/Near the Delta, Central Valley, and North Bay included the following counties among the survey respondents:

- **In/Near the Delta** – Sacramento County, San Joaquin County, Solano County, and Contra Costa County
- **Central Valley** – Fresno County, Kern County, Kings County, Merced County, and Tulare County

- **North Bay** – Alameda County

In order to get statewide representation for the survey, additional communities were included in a second round of interviews. For the second round of interviews, stakeholders were selected based on their dependence on Central Valley or State Water Project exports, as well as the percentage of low-income and/or ethnic residents in their respective communities. The second round of interviews included communities in southern California, South Bay, and along the Central Coast. Additional questions were asked of these communities related to water costs and water availability to help gauge overall knowledge of water supply issues.

The geographical regions represented by the areas defined as South Bay, Southern California, and Central Coast includes the following counties among the survey respondents:

- **South Bay** – San Benito County and Santa Clara County
- **Southern California** – Los Angeles County, Orange County, Riverside County, San Bernardino County, and San Diego County
- **Central Coast** – Santa Barbara County and San Luis Obispo County

It should be noted that no calls were made to areas north of Sacramento or the Delta at this time. Surveys focused primarily on areas that would bear direct impacts from construction of water conveyance facilities or the implementation of habitat restoration areas, as well as regions dependent upon state and federal water exports. However, if/when information on upstream water users needs to be obtained to fully explore and identify issues of concern in geographic regions farther north, additional interviews can be conducted and information analyzed at that time.

1.6 Issues Discussed

Information related to the following topics was obtained from people who resided or worked In/Near the Delta, Central Valley, or North Bay (round 1 interviews):

- Perceptions of the current state of the Delta
- Primary uses of the Delta
- Key information about the respondent and/or the communities he/she represents (ethnic, cultural, business type, etc.)
- Community diversity
- Employment
- Information and communication resources

Additional questions were asked of respondents outside of the Delta region (round 2 interviews), on issues including:

- Familiarity with the Delta and regional water issues
- Water quality
- Water availability

1.7 About this Report

This report summarizes the interviews conducted for the purposes of providing DWR and the BDCP environmental review team a general sense of the responses received by region. Results from this survey and information provided in this report will help the environmental review team gather information for the EIR/EIS, as well as provide important community and stakeholder information to the community outreach team.

Appendix A includes the survey responses, Appendix B includes the survey script and questions, and Appendix C includes a comprehensive list of all respondents (including those contacted who declined to participate).

The report is divided into eight sections, each representing a region of California. It is then further categorized by respondent type for each region, including:

- Agriculture (Agriculture)
- Community or Faith-Based Organizations (Community)
- Ethnic Organizations (Ethnic)
- Businesses (Business)
- Elected or Government Officials (Elected)
- Public Interest Groups or Environmental Organizations (Interested Parties)

Each regional section outlines the number of interviews conducted in that region, the number of interviews conducted in each city of that region, and the type and organizations that provided respondents to the survey.

As stated above in the Methodology Limitations subsection, this report does not provide data that is statistically representative of a larger population. For example, in some instances, there is only one respondent for a subsection of a region. It would be statistically invalid to draw conclusions for the entire state based on only one interview.

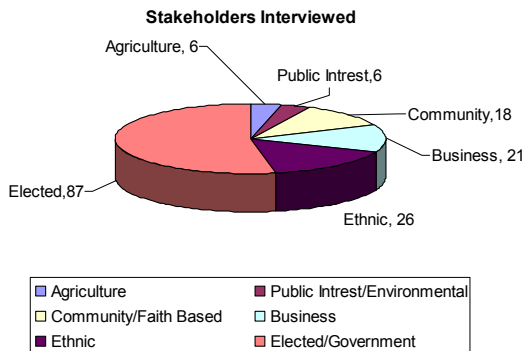
No conclusions are presented in this report; this report presents survey respondent opinions which may serve as a means to identify potential issues of concern and information for consideration throughout the BDCP environmental review process.

2.0 SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Two individual rounds of interviews were conducted as part of the interview process. The first round of interviews included key stakeholders in communities in/near the Delta, Central Valley, and North Bay. However, in order to get statewide representation for the survey, additional communities were included in a second round of interviews. The second round of interviews included communities in southern California, South Bay, and along the California coast.

2.1 In/Near the Delta, Central Valley and North Bay

Overall, interview respondents expressed concern over the current state of the Delta. When unprompted about current issues in the Delta, many stated their main concerns are associated with the fragility of the levees and infrastructure, and the potential for flooding should an earthquake or another natural disaster occur. Others referenced water supply protection – both in the quality and quantity of water available within the Delta and available for exports.



When talking about water quality, respondents believe the main issues to be addressed are saltwater intrusion, lack of water storage, general lack of wildlife protection, and a poor balance between the farming industry and the protection of the environment.

Although many respondents did not suggest a solution to address these concerns, some stated that an overall strategic approach needs to be taken to “fix” the Delta, and the piecemeal approach believed to be currently underway will not address any of the Delta’s issues. Many respondents mentioned during the course of conversation the lack of communication about the Delta’s issues and solutions, and thought a better, more comprehensive public outreach program is needed to educate residents in the state about the state’s water crisis and other water related issues.

Many respondents discussed the benefits they associate with the Delta, including its water supply to the state, the recreational opportunities available, the farming and agriculture it supports, and its abundance of wildlife and habitat. There were a few respondents who do not have any concerns about the Delta and believe its current state is “adequate” or “fine.”

In addition to Delta issues such as flooding, endangered/threatened species, and water quality, issues raised included:

- Lack of knowledge/understanding about what's happening in the Delta
- Water rights
- Water flow

- Export commitments
- Environmental opinions about the Delta smelt
- Water diversions
- High-risk plants and/or non-native plant species
- Threat of the peripheral canal
- Pollution
- Intent to reclaim lands in Delta as part of "fix"
- Output from local treatment centers
- Groundwater monitoring
- Water pumping
- Urbanization around the Delta
- Mercury contamination

2.1.1 Type of Community

Most respondents feel their community is unique to other communities. Although their reasons varied, most respondents believe that their community is unique due to water source, or lack thereof, type of community, type of employment, and location. When describing their community and what makes it unique, many respondents believe that their community is unique because of the employment source or because of employment/unemployment statistics. For example, many say their communities are unique because they believe them to have a higher percentage of unemployment than other communities in the state. In addition, location is something respondents offered as a source of community uniqueness. Many respondents feel that their community is unique due to being rural or near the Delta.

2.1.2 Community Diversity

When asked about the ethnic makeup of their community, many respondents prefaced their answers by explaining the diverse nature of their community. However, when asked about their community's primary ethnic makeup, most indicated their communities are predominantly Latino, followed by Caucasian, Black, and Asian. Given the primary ethnic makeup of the communities surveyed, the primary languages spoken are reported as: English, Spanish, and many Asian languages (Hmong, Chinese, Vietnamese, Japanese), with a small percentage of Tagalog.

2.1.3 Employment

A slight majority of those surveyed believe farming to be a primary source of employment, while the remaining respondents feel other industries such as construction and retail serve as the primary source of employment.

For those communities reliant upon on farming as a primary source of employment, the crops identified varied widely. Most farms are reported to be on the smaller side (employing

50 people or less). In general, the ethnic makeup of the farms mirrored the ethnic makeup of the community, with a high percentage of Latinos and Caucasians either working on, or owning, farming operations.

When farming was not identified as the primary source of employment, the following industries were given as the major source of employment:

- Government
- Manufacturing
- Service industry
- Education
- Professional services
- Healthcare
- Business owners
- Construction
- Technology
- Military
- Casino
- Biomedical

In general, businesses or types of businesses reported as owned or frequented by ethnic groups include:

- Grocery stores
- Restaurants
- Retailers (such as Walmart, Costco)
- Chambers of Commerce
- Senior and recreational centers
- Churches

2.1.4 Community Events and Activities

Most communities interviewed identified events and activities that are seen as important. Generally these activities include community events, recreational activities, annual festivals, religious-oriented activities, sporting events, fundraisers, concerts, family activities, farmers' markets, volunteering activities and chamber of commerce events.

These community events and gatherings were reported as important to the community for many reasons. Some events are steeped in tradition and are celebrated for cultural purposes. Others bring members of the community together by providing fun, family-oriented activities, while maintaining or improving the quality of life for those residents. Overall, they allow for increased participation for community members, bringing them closer together while providing an opportunity to share information and experiences.

When asked if certain ethnic or cultural groups engage in specific activities or go to events that have specific meaning to only those particular groups, a mix of responses were received. However, many specific and general events and activities were provided within each region, including:

2.1.5 Delta Uses by the Community

Respondents are evenly split on whether they feel a certain ethnic or cultural group uses the surrounding rivers, lakes and/or streams to fish more than others. Of the half of respondents who believe a certain ethnic or cultural group does use the area more than other groups, the majority think that ethnic group is Asian, followed by Latino, then Black, and lastly Caucasians.

Respondents believe that these ethnic groups frequent the Delta for both recreational and food purposes, with slightly higher responses given for recreational uses. However, of those who do fish in the Delta for food, most do so because it is economical. A smaller group of individuals fish for food because it is part of their culture.

Those who frequent the Delta for recreational purposes reported doing so because it is convenient and easily accessible, and they find an abundance of fish. While all ethnic backgrounds reported frequenting the following areas for recreational purposes, Latinos and Asians are the primary ethnic groups identified as using the region for recreational purposes. Although the intention was to limit the responses to bodies of water within the Delta, many provided popular areas outside the Delta as well. Popular areas cited include:

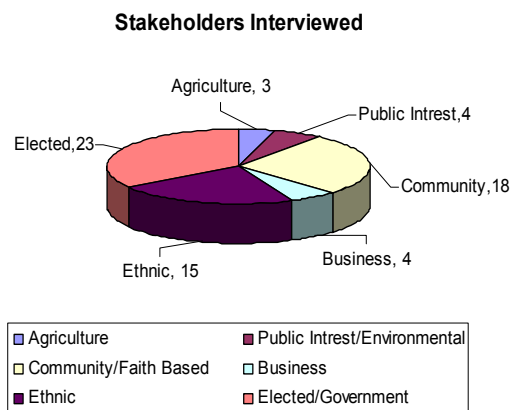

The majority of the respondents identified Latinos as the largest percentage of low-income residents in their communities.

2.2 South Bay, Southern California, and Central Coast

A majority of those interviewed indicated that they are familiar with the issues impacting the Delta and of those, many have heard news stories about the Delta or Delta-related issues in the past 6 to 12 months. Some of the Delta-related issues heard by the respondents include:

- Protection of the Delta smelt and other fish
- Water delivery amounts from northern California to southern California
- Overall environmental impacts
- Levee stability and flooding concerns
- Water quality
- Construction of a canal
- Agricultural and farming concerns
- Water supply shortages



The respondents indicated that the news stories they had heard closely mirror the concerns they personally have or have heard elsewhere.

When respondents were asked for their opinion on the Delta's primary use or need, many cited water supply (drinking water), followed by farming, environment/habitat, boating and recreation, fishing, navigation by ships, and housing/jobs. When asked for their views on

what the primary purpose of the Delta ought to be, the number one response was also water supply (drinking water), followed by farming, environment/habitat, boating and recreation, navigation by ships, fishing, and housing/jobs. However, many of the respondents also indicated that they believe a large portion of their water supply comes from the Colorado River or other water sources outside of the Delta.

Only half of those surveyed from Southern California had visited the Delta, and had done so for business or recreation reasons, or lived in the area at one point. Others have driven through on their way to other destinations, and a handful had been on sponsored tours of the area. For the half who had never visited the Delta, many feel that it is too far away, have no interest in the area, or it had not occurred to them to visit.

When prompted about current conditions in the Delta, two-thirds of the respondents were familiar with flood hazards associated with levee failures and the status of endangered fish, including Delta smelt. However, only half are familiar with the condition of fish, including bass, salmon, and sturgeon, and water quality conditions. Other Delta conditions cited include:

- Lack of water and impacts to farmers and agriculture
- Water supply

The majority of respondents believe that their community has water quality and availability issues, and about half feel that the community has water affordability issues. The majority of those asked do not know where their water comes from.

When asked about the primary cause of the water quality, availability, and reliability issues, respondents were evenly split between environmental factors (drought, habitat needs, other), lack of water being exported from Northern California, and political opinions.

Almost all respondents reported the existence of both voluntary and/or mandatory conservation programs in their community. For those few respondents who are not aware of or whose community does not have formalized conservation programs, many think it would be a good idea to start water conservation efforts in their community.

As it relates to water affordability, only a small group of respondents believe their community could afford an increase in water costs. However, they could not quantify the level or percentage of increase their community could afford. Most others believe the people in their communities would not be able to afford an increase in water costs even if it meant higher quality water or a more reliable source of water. And at the same time, the respondents recognized that the agricultural, commercial, or industrial businesses are impacted in some way by water quality, reliability, or availability issues.

2.2.1 Impacts on the Community

During the survey, the respondents were asked a series of questions related to specific impacts on their communities should water supplies decrease from current levels, or if water

costs are increased to maintain the current level of water supplies. The specific categories of impacts included residential, agricultural, industrial, or commercial industries and are summarized below.

2.2.1.1 Residential

When asked about impacts due to water supplies being decreased from current levels, many reported that community members' lifestyles would change and their quality of life would be impacted: they would landscape less, be forced to conserve more, be more responsible about their water usage and decrease activities such as car washing. There would be a fiscal and economic impact as well – many would lose their jobs – due to lack of water. It would also cause hardships for families and non-profit organizations (food banks), creating more foreclosures and forcing residents to leave their current communities.

When asked about impacts caused by increases in water costs to maintain current supplies, the response was similar to those reported above. Although some indicated that certain portions of their community would be able to afford an increase in costs, the majority would be greatly impacted, especially low-income areas and seniors on fixed budgets.

2.2.1.2 Agricultural

Many respondents suspect that agriculture would be hit hardest with a reduction in water or an increase in the cost of water. Respondents stated farmers would have to reduce production of goods, and would potentially not survive further water cutbacks, resulting in the closure of many farms. Many said cost increases would be passed along to the end customer, making it difficult to afford California-farmed goods and products.

Some believed with a cutback in the agricultural industry there would be a larger, negative impact on the overall economy of California.

2.2.1.3 Industrial and Commercial

Respondents lumped industrial and commercial into one category, referencing a cutback in water or an increase in the cost of water as having the same impacts on these industries. Many believed that one of two things would happen to these two industries:

1. Any increase in cost would be passed along to the customer.
2. They could not survive a cutback in water and would ultimately have to close down, again resulting in a greater economic impact for California.

2.2.2 Type of Community

Most respondents feel their community is unique to other communities. Although responses varied, many cited diverse populations – ethnically, culturally and economically. Others feel their community is unique because of the community's location, size, topography, and geography. Some feel the active lifestyle and ties to nature make their community unique.

Water source and types of jobs held by community members were also provided as responses.

2.2.3 Community Diversity

When asked about the ethnic makeup of the community, many prefaced their answers by saying the community is very diverse. However, when asked about the primary ethnic makeup, most indicated their communities are predominantly Latino, followed by Caucasian, Asian, and Black. The primary languages identified as spoken in the communities are: English, Spanish, and many Asian languages (Korean, Cambodian, Vietnamese, Japanese), with a smaller percentage of Tagalog as the primary language in the community.

The major employment types cited include:

The majority of the respondents said Latinos make up the largest percentage of low-income residents in their communities.

While the interview findings would seem to indicate that many/most respondents are familiar with the Delta, many also lacked a strong understanding about their own water supplies as they relate to the Delta. It was also difficult for many respondents to determine fact versus fiction in information they obtain from other sources. Some of the respondents who lacked a strong knowledge of Delta-related issues indicated that it is because there is not enough reliable information, education, and awareness currently available about Delta issues. Others, specifically those outside of the Delta region, stated that the primary reason for lack of knowledge and awareness is simply geography – they are too far from the Delta to have immediate or intimate awareness of it.

3.1 Agriculture Responses

Two interviews were categorized as “agricultural” in the “In/Near Delta” region. Below is the summary of findings for those interviews.

3.1.1 General Delta-Related

How do you feel about the current state of the Delta?

Both respondents believe the Delta faces challenges due to the amount of water that is “exported” or delivered to other parts of the state. One respondent indicated that the only problem with the Delta is “the way water is moved,” and historically the Delta has been “sustainable – both economically and socially.” The second respondent on the other hand is “not very happy about the state of the Delta.”

What do you think are its best attributes and why?

Both respondents provided a response to this question and offered the following attributes (each response was provided once):

- Largest estuary on the West Coast
- Thousands of miles of waterways
- Recreational opportunities
- Water delivery
- Wildlife habitat
- Productive agricultural base
- Fertile farmland
- Beautiful riparian areas/scenery

What do you think it needs to be done to “fix” it?

Both respondents provided a response to this question.

Respondents provided suggestions on ways to “fix” the Delta, including (each response was provided once):

- Improve water delivery system
- Do not construct any kind of canal
- Long-term commitment to the land mass in the Delta
- Cease removal of fresh water from the Delta
- Create a system that that separates water from fish

Are you familiar with the current conditions of the Delta, such as:

- **Flood hazards associated with levee failures?**

Both respondents who answered this question are familiar with flood hazards associated with levee failures.

- **Condition of fish, including bass, salmon, and sturgeon?**

Both respondents who answered this question are familiar with the condition of fish, including bass, salmon, and sturgeon.

- **Status of endangered fish, including Delta smelt?**

Both respondents who answered this question are familiar with the status of endangered fish, including Delta smelt.

- **Water quality?**

Both respondents who answered this question are familiar with current water quality conditions.

- **Are there other issues in the Delta that you think we should be aware of?**

Other issues offered include:

- Invasive species
- Water rights
- Agricultural viability
- Economic viability

Do you work or live in the Delta, or both?

Both respondents live and work in the Delta.

3.1.2 Understanding Community Character

Why do you choose to live and/or work in the Delta area?

Both respondents indicated that they grew up in the Delta. One respondents father bought his farm in the 1940s and it has been in the family ever since. The other respondent indicated that he chooses to live/work in the delta for economic and recreational purposes.

Do you think your community is unique to other communities, either inside or outside of the Delta?

One of the two respondents indicted his community is unique.

What would you say makes your community unique or special?

When asked for specific reasons of why their communities are unique, the following was provided by the one respondent who believes that his community is unique:

- Slow growth
- Size
- Personality
- Type of people
- Community culture
- Location
- Geography

Do you see your family remaining in for generations to come? Why or why not?

One respondent indicated that his family would remain in the Delta because “they already have the 5th generation involved in the business.” The second respondent was unsure because he is uncertain if farming interested other members of his family.

What activities are important to your community (i.e. what cultural events, community group meetings, annual festivals, etc. are important to your community)?

One respondent provided both specific and general types of events that are important to his community, including:

3.2.1 General Delta-Related

How do you feel about the current state of the Delta?

Ten of the 12 respondents provided a response to this question. Generally, respondents acknowledged that the Delta is “in trouble,” “in need of help” and “broken.” Specific reasons for this general feeling of concern for the Delta include:

- Saltwater intrusion (2)

- Depleting the Delta’s resources to support southern California’s water needs or growth (2)

What do you think are its best attributes and why?

Seven of the 12 respondents offered a wide range of attributes including:

Eleven of the 12 respondents are familiar with flood hazards associated with levee failures.

- **Condition of fish, including bass, salmon, and sturgeon?**

Ten of the 11 respondents are familiar with the condition of fish, including bass, salmon, and sturgeon.

- **Status of endangered fish, including Delta smelt?**

Ten of the 12 respondents are familiar with the status of endangered fish, including Delta smelt.

- **Water quality?**

Nine of the 12 respondents are familiar with current water quality conditions.

- **Are there other issues in the Delta that you think we should be aware of?**

Other issues offered include:

- People are using the Delta as a dumping site
- Water flow issues
- Ammonia discharge from desalination
- Increased education and public outreach about the delicacy of the Delta’s ecosystem
- The need for both saltwater and fresh water in the Delta region
- Consequences of diverting water to other areas

Eleven of the 12 respondents answered this question. Eight respondents both work and live in the Delta, two only work in the Delta, and one only lives in the Delta.

Do you believe that certain ethnic or cultural groups use the surrounding rivers, lakes, and/or streams to fish more than others?

Seven of the 12 respondents indicated that certain ethnic or cultural groups use the surrounding rivers, lakes, and/or streams to fish.

Five of those seven identified the following specific groups:

Reasons given for using the area are:

- Recreation and food (5)

When food was given as the reason for the use of the surrounding area, four respondents indicated it is for cultural or economic reasons, and one indicated it is based on preference.

When recreation was given as the reason for the use of the surrounding areas, one respondent said it is due to the area's familiarity, another indicated it is because of location, and another said because of the type of fish in the area.

Mr. Capuchino is concerned about the water quality in the Delta. He believes that larger cities such as Stockton and Sacramento are releasing waste into the rivers in the Delta. He believes that many people think this water will just end up the ocean, but a good amount of the waste will remain in the Delta which will lead to poor water quality.

He is only hearing negative comments and concerns about the Delta

He believes DWR needs to address the issue of the smelt dying off and work to fix the problem. He also thinks the issue of non-native fish that have infiltrated the Delta are a problem. They can present new diseases to native fish and might be predators of the native fish. This would make the ecosystem of the Delta off balance.

He also believes more should be done to improve the water quality of the Delta. This might include more recycling of waste water instead of releasing it into the Delta. Families are making about \$10,000 a year and they are large size families. Due to water reduction farmers want more done for less, the farmers are letting go of a lot of workers because they cannot afford to pay many employees.

If someone thinks or tries to bring a Union to get involved, they are let go making it hard to have a voice for the workers. United Farm Workers does a lot but they cannot be everywhere.

The ones who are affected the most are the laborers, farms owners do as well but it's much different. More water is needed in order to keep and have jobs available.

General Delta Related

1. How do you feel about the current state of the Delta?

He thinks that the Delta has its challenges. They are more related to water delivery and water conveyance than the environment. The Delta has been sustainable – sustaining agriculture and habitat – over time without major costs. The problem is water, and the way water is moved, as well as invasive species. Talk about potential earthquakes, subsidence, etc. is only fear mongering. The Delta has been sustainable – both economically and socially.

a. Positive: what do you think are its best attributes and why?

The Delta is the largest estuary on the west coast. It has 1,000 miles of waterways used for recreation, water delivery, as habitat for fisheries, and it has very strong/productive agricultural base. It is surrounded by large metropolitan areas. Areas of open space in the Delta are used for recreation by surrounding areas. It's a playground, an environmental jewel, on the same magnitude as Yosemite, Yellowstone, etc. It's unique. It provides a lot of services. A great number of fish use Delta to live and travel through. This is not bad, but it has to be done in manner that is friendly to the environment.

b. Negative: what do you think it needs to be done to "fix" it?

There needs to be a long-term commitment to the land mass in Delta. The land mass needs to be saved and paid for by all that benefit from the Delta – not just recreation, but water supply as well. The key for him is that no more fresh water be removed from the system before it gets to the Delta – either from San Joaquin or the Sacramento Rivers. Water quality in the San Joaquin River is very

poor. In the Sacramento River that hasn't happened. The Delta is dependant upon the Sacramento River for water quality. Anything that takes water out of the Delta before it enters the Delta is to him a real negative. To protect the Delta, we need to keep water in the Delta. He is not suggesting that we rely on the system we use to today. There needs to be a system that separates the fish from water – a through Delta conveyance. This can be done less expensively and can be more adaptive.

One other item that is beginning to trouble him is the water rights in the Delta. They are being attacked in the South Delta. Some water users are being sued. There needs to be a clear definition of the Delta's priority with regards to water that is in the system. When projects were put in place to export water from Delta, a commitment was made that it would be from a common pool and that area of origin would have priority. This is being attacked.

Also, the agricultural viability and economic viability of communities is another issue that needs to be addressed.

During the shad run, many Southeast Asians are fishing. Some are dependent upon that as a food source, or additional food source. There is a group surrounding the Delta using the Delta fishing as a means to augment their food supply. Part of it is cultural and part of it is preference. Economically, I really don't know. As you get closer to town, the levees are owned privately, the RDs maintain them. It's OK. He said he is not big on the environmental side. There are issues with salmon and that kind of thing because of the habitat. Other than that, I he doesn't stay up on the local stuff. The canal thing is a big deal.

a. Positive: what do you think are its best attributes and why?

The small communities are an asset. It's a really good agricultural center for the state. Pear production is primary in this area – the largest pear producing area in California. There are a lot of grapes. It's a healthy agriculture center. There's also a human investment in the communities there that's pretty important – long-standing community people – four to five generations of farmers. They are committed to the area. Not real friendly to outsiders, and most of them don't want growth. There are probably good reasons for that, but it's not a real friendly place to move to and try to fit in. They are pretty closed in that regard.

b. Negative: what do you think it needs to be done to "fix" it?

He doesn't know that there needs to be any fixes. When they take water out, they'll create some issues that they haven't thought of. That's the main source for habitat and irrigation here. He doesn't see a need to fix anything. He doesn't see any problems that exist that this canal project is going to solve. It's going to create more issues, depending on how they do it. There is potential that we'd have to close schools. The schools are kind of the heartbeat of the community. Most of the communities don't have other places

to meet, they don't have facilities for recreation – they use the schools. The viability of schools is pretty critical to the health of the community.

Their district experienced a school closure and flood in the 70's in Isleton. It was costly and expensive to fix. The condition of the levees has been in the public eye for some time. Jones Tract was the latest one that flooded. That was a big deal.

Not really. He knows folks who are fisherman who are interested in going fishing. Recreation there is a big thing.

He wanted to know: How's that going to be impacted with taking water out of the Delta?

Water quality, particularly arsenic, is becoming a problem in domestic water systems. We have three schools in the Sacramento County area, two of which have their own well system. In Yolo County we have two schools with their own wells. All five schools are impacted by arsenic. They are having difficulty meeting the arsenic criteria. It's a very costly process. They are looking for grants. They are in danger of the water system not having enough water to meet community needs. One of the things he is doing to help them is to suspend irrigation watering at night and during the day this week. At the hottest part of the summer, They're neglecting watering in grasslands, etc. This could be negative if plants suffer and die.

e. Are there other issues in the Delta that you think we should be aware of?

He couldn't think of anything offhand. A lot of the communities may or may not have a common source of domestic water. For example, in Courtland, the school has a water system and all the individuals that live there are tied into joint smaller systems. The County doesn't have a system. In Walnut Grove,

the County does have a system. There has been some talk about having us join their County system.

In Locke, they have Al the Wop restaurant – a steakhouse – it's a really unique environment. It has an old building, old bar, and a dining hall. There is a local paper in the Delta – the River News Herald. It’s published in Rio Vista and distributed up through Clarksburg. The high school in Rio Vista has a radio station and they do a lot of community announcements – it’s an FM station – it’s got a 40 or 50 year history there. It’s handled by the community, not the school. They have a Friday night deal for students to be DJs.

The schools are involved in doing a couple of things. In Walnut Grove, Courtland, and Clarksburg, a school nurse has gotten mobile dental services to come in that are mainly helpful for the migrant workers. He thinks that a year or two ago, there was some changes in kindergarten requirements where in order to go to school, kids had to have dental exams. So, the community got together to help with that. That’s been pretty successful. In Rio Vista they do a Kinder camp, where kids going into kindergarten have a two week pre-kindergarten deal where they get introduced to teachers, the program. There are some local doctors. In Courtland there is a local doctor that holds office hours. In Rio Vista there’s a group called Rio Vista CARE that is a community organization helping locals who can’t afford mental health services, social programs, etc. There is a medical facility – a small office –

with a doctor. There are not any emergency services. His son takes his kids there when they're sick. There is a medical program out of Fairfield that has outreach down here. In Rio Vista there are several dentists.

Latino, there has been an anomaly – a declining enrollment in the school district. This is new to California. Overall, California is losing its student population. For their community, they are down to about 2,000 students, from 2,400 when he first came to the area. When he looks around town, he sees that there have been foreclosures and - more than he has ever seen - houses for rent. He started looking for housing there 10 years ago, the only place he could find with homes for sale were in Rio Vista. Now that's not the case. He thinks a lot of the poorer people may have left there to go to areas where they wouldn't commute so far. Gas prices (the high prices a few years ago) probably drove people out. The community is close to Vacaville, Pittsburg, Antioch, Brentwood – you could commute there reasonably.

It is dreadfully in need of repair and fast becoming a cesspool because of lack of freshwater circulation. This is how people in San Joaquin County feel.

a. Positive: what do you think are its best attributes and why?

Ecology, environment, fisheries, recreation that Delta provides people, and the water supplies to various communities and farms.

b. Negative: what do you think it needs to be done to "fix" it?

Delta Vision mentioned a lot of things that need to be done. Certainly the fact that pumps are shut down during certain parts of year, which restricts water flow. If you have a body of water that water comes in and instead of going through, it stagnates. It goes out to the Golden Gate to the benefit of no one. A lot of things being are proposed to fix the Delta. The California Partnership for San Joaquin Valley is a group established by an Executive Order of the Governor about 3-4 years ago now. It included eight counties in Valley. Water is one issue that the Governor wanted them to take a run at. It's been very successful. One member of the Board of Supervisors from every county sits on the Board, as well as one member from the Governors Cabinet, and eight business people. They have come up with a number of things that could be worked on. Over the last three years the water group has made great strides and the one thing they've decided is that there is no agreement on the peripheral canal and that they need to work on the things they all agree on. Ray Watson, the chairman of the water work group, he's representing the south of the

state. Fritz Grupe is co-chairing the Partnership group itself has been instrumental in bringing people together from San Joaquin County all the way down to Fresno. They have developed a good relationship with the Metropolitan Water District.

He is an engineer by trade and has done a lot of development adjacent to the Delta. He had to work with FEMA and Corps. He does not believe that there will be a catastrophic earthquake that will liquefy islands in his lifetime. That has never happened.

b. condition of fish, including bass, salmon and sturgeon YES **NO**

He does not know an awful lot about that. The little critter he has heard the most about is the food for those fish – the smelt. There are all kinds of science about the smelt. Are the pumps the culprit or are the bass, etc. the culprit? He feels no one is saying anything about the bass because the fishermen have a big lobby. He believes no one wants to touch the other fish as the reason for smelt heading towards extinction.

c. status of endangered fish, including Delta smelt YES **NO**

He believes he is not a good source of information on that topic. He knows a lot of people that fish in the Delta. Many complain about the quantity of fish going down.

d. Water quality **YES** NO

He believes water quality extraordinarily important. The City of Stockton has a Delta water project that has passed muster and has gotten permits. That project, which allows the City of Stockton to take water, is very important. The better the quality of the water, the less they have to treat the water. That's very important to the Delta and everyone who has a straw in the Delta. The quality in the Delta has diminished over time.

He stated that the farmers and landowners and Reclamation Districts in the Delta – everyone that sees the Delta as an asset are terribly concerned about what a peripheral canal would do to the Delta. They are not necessarily in favor of the dual system – they think that's nothing but a subterfuge. They don't feel they have control over who makes the decision regarding if it works or not. There are 25-50

years of promises being made for the Delta that haven't been kept. There is a great deal of disinterest in hearing people - The Corps, the feds, DWR, the state of CA, etc. - promise things. It's pretty hard to convince them that the dual system would work. And, there are significant landowners that would be in court.

No. He didn't think so. He believes Stockton is more dependent on the Delta than some of the other communities. The Delta is used as a dumping ground for a lot of wastewater treatment facilities. The water dispersed in the Delta after treatment is better than any water in the Delta already. He believes that is because of regulations from DWR and other agencies. He believes Stockton is more dependent on the Delta for treated wastewater. The City of Lodi does similar things. So does Tracy.

They have a large boating community. Also, the Stockton deep water channel runs right through the heart of the Delta. He believes of the use of the deep water channel in the Delta is altered in some fashion because of new requirements that would be bad for our community and for fish.

San Joaquin County is the major provider of social services. He stated that they have put together an organization called the Community Partnership for Families. It was a result of problems people were having getting service from the County. Low income people had to try to find a way (e.g. transportation) to get to an office that might provide food stamps, or go to another office for health care, etc. The City said it didn't make sense because of lack of transportation. They looked at putting together some community centers where county and other agencies could put services where the people are located and get out of the "ivory tower." Its been very successful. It's most successful in Stockton. Most facilities are in the south Stockton area, and they have one in Lodi, one in Tracy, and one in Manteca. They have created a program where a lot of lower income people don't even realize they qualify – they help them fill out the appropriate forms. The County now looks at it as an adjunct to services they provide.

He said that the Laotian community is a very close knit community that provides a lot of support for each other. Fishing is very important to the Laotian community not only for economic and cultural reasons, but also for creating a social outlet for them. The fish that are caught are sometimes used to provide for more than one family. He thinks that the Laotian community has adapted well to the Western culture because some now celebrate Christmas as a festival; however, they also celebrate their own festivals such as the Laotian New Years, Laotian weddings, baby showers and funerals. He said that the Laotian culture is different from the Western culture because they have to invite everyone they know to everything that they host, where as in the Western culture you can pick and choose who you would like to invite.

These events are important because they uphold a way of life, culture and a social network.

Because of the limited water supply coming from the pumps, hundreds of residents lack the water they need due to pending ecological issues. She

She realizes that the Delta has to be part of the solution and things cannot be fixed on its own. She believes that there needs to be a comprehensive solution to get the pumps back up and pumping to the capacity at which they were built to operate. Ms. Steven said that farmers in her area made decisions on what crops they were capable of planting this year based on the preliminary water allocations. However, when the water allocations changed so did the farmer's crop results. Tulare County is getting less and less water each year and the underground water supply is over drafted. She said several farmers are coming to her and explaining that they are personally spending hundreds of thousands of dollars on wells to provide their farms with water and are coming up with very little. Ms. Steven says that they cannot expect anyone to cripple the Delta for the benefit of another region of the state, however, there needs to be more water conservation, dams built and above ground and below ground water storage occurring to avoid crippling any part of the state.

He feels that the whole state of California is riding on the Delta and that we are building houses in the desert while the Delta is supporting them. He thinks that it is a mistake to turn any land back to a salt marsh and that there is no going back at this point. He thinks that turning the land back into a salt marsh will only drudge up more selenium and mercury.

a. **Positive:** what do you think are its best attributes and why?

He thinks that the Delta's most positive attributes are that it provides a source of recreation, it is always in the top 50 places to hunt and fish, it can be used for commercial purposes for Bay-Delta towns and there is a possibility of a deep-water port in the area. He thinks that agriculturally it is the best land in California. Also, he said that there are a lot of leavings from the Gold Rush Days that could be reprocessed. He is mad that while Southern California is only one small part of the state, 20 percent for California's energy is spent sending water south.
