



#### Water Supply Strategy

# If drought conditions persist, new short-term requirements could take effect no later than spring 2023.

- Emergency conservation measures that would expedite implementation of conservation in a way that is already mandated through the 2018 laws.
- The new requirements would consider the relative efficiency of each supplier. These new efficiency targets would therefore work as a bridge to take California from voluntary measures to efficiency-based, water-use budgets that account for differences in climate zones, landscape area, population, and other factors.



#### Evolution of Conservation Key Messages


- We are in drought (the entire state)
- Water waste during drought is not acceptable
- Water use is weather driven
- Most urban water use is outdoors cutting back outdoor use results in the most savings
- With climate change and aridification, drought is no longer temporary – and conservation is now a way of life

#### California drought: Water conservation increasing statewide, Bay Area saving more than Southern California

Statewide urban water use fell 7.6% in June, short of Gov. Gavin Newsom's 15% target, but double the savings in May

- - Reporters leveraged our data to examine local patterns of water use, and call into question local decisions
- As the media became familiarized with our data it became a trusted source and launching point for other stories
- Localized reporting drove a better understanding of how weather influences water use driving home the amount that is used outdoors

#### Helping us make the case for restrictions

- Explained record-shattering dryness & the nexus with low conservation numbers
- Helped build a sense of urgency and support for Executive Order, SWCRB regulations and strict local cutbacks
- While critical of state policy at times, the media has become a partner in amplifying conservation messages
