PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The subject site is an apartment building located at 616 S. Masselin Avenue, Los Angeles, California. General NPDES Permit No. CAG994001, Order No. 97-045, was issued to the subject facility on June 30, 1997 for dewatering activity from the subterranean parking garage. On October 17, 2002, PMG Tiffany Ltd (PMG) submitted a Notice of Intent (NOI) form to continue enrollment under General Permit No. CAG994004, Order No. R4-2003-0111, adopted by this Board on August 7, 2003.

VOLUME AND DESCRIPTION OF DISCHARGE

Up to 15,000 gallons per day of groundwater is discharged to the storm drain located at Latitude 34°03'51", Longitude 118°21'07", thence to Ballona Creek, a water of the United States. The site location map is shown as Figure 1.

APPLICABLE EFFLUENT LIMITATIONS

Based on the information provided in the NPDES Application Supplemental Requirements, the following constituents listed in the table below have been determined to show reasonable potential to exist in the discharge. The dewatering discharge flows into Ballona Creek, therefore, the discharge limitations in Attachment B are not applicable to the discharge.
