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I. Order

This Clean Water Act (CWA) section 401 Water Quality Certification action and Order (Order) is issued at the request of the Newhall Land and Farming Company, a wholly owned subsidiary of Five Point Holdings, LLC, (herein after Permittee) for the Project. This Order is for the purpose described in application and supplemental information submitted by the Permittee. The application was received on February 16, 2018. The application was deemed complete on May 21, 2018.

II. Public Notice

The Los Angeles Water Board provided public notice of the application pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 23, section 3858 from February 27, 2018 to the effective date of Order. The Los Angeles Water Board did not receive any comments during the comment period.

III. Project Purpose

The purpose of the Project is to construct two debris basis (debris retaining inlets) to meet flood control requirements for natural open areas upstream of the Mission Village Tract development, and to allow for passage of upstream drainage.

IV. Project Description

Mission Village is one of five villages within the Newhall Ranch Specific Plan, a large-scale mixed-used community located in unincorporated Santa Clarita Valley in northwestern Los Angeles County. The Mission Village tract map is located within the Newhall Ranch Resource Management and Development Plan/Spineflower Conservation Plan (RMDP/SCP) area. The approved RMDP/SCP is a comprehensive conservation, mitigation, and permitting plan for the long-term management of special-status biological resources for the Newhall Specific Plan, which includes Mission Village. The Los Angeles Water Board adopted Waste Discharge Requirements and Clean Water Act Section 401 Water Quality Certification for the RMDP on September 14, 2012 (Order R4-2012-0139, File No. 11-168).

In order to complete construction activities associated with the first phase of the Mission Village Development, the Permittee will construct two debris basins in adjacent open space areas. At the time of the development of the RMDP, the adjacent open space property was not under the direction or control of the Permittee, and therefore the RMDP permit limit stops at the southern boundary of the Mission Village tract. These basins are necessary to capture debris laden stormwater run-off from the unimproved open areas south of the Mission Village development. The debris basins are proposed within the Magic Mountain Canyon (Debris Basin 1) and Middle Canyon (Debris Basin 4) drainages, just south of the Mission Village Tract boundary and the area covered by the RMDP (Attachment A, Figure 1, Project Location Map).

Debris Basin 1-Magic Mountain Canyon Drainage: Due to bulk grading and rough grading activities in preparation for pad development and road construction for the initial phase of development of Mission Village, the Permittee will clear and grade the off-site reach designated as Magic Mountain Canyon-6 to create a 23,000 cubic yard capacity debris basin which meets the County of Los Angeles Qcap (50-Year) burned and bulked flow design criteria and provide for positive flow (Attachment A, Figure 2, Plan View of Debris Basin in Magic Mountain Canyon Drainage). As shown in Attachment A, Figure 3, Cross-Section of Proposed Debris Basin in Magic Mountain Canyon Drainage, the existing topography of the

basin area allows for the natural stream bed to remain in place, with debris basin structures and perimeter berms located outside of the jurisdictional area. The debris basin will include an outlet structure, concrete facing at the northern end, and an access ramp. Impacts to Magic Mountain Canyon drainage are limited to surface grading disturbance to 265 linear feet to create the basin bottom, with an additional 290 linear feet of disturbance for vegetation removal only at the upper portions of the basin. Temporary impacts will occur within 0.23 acre of non-wetland Waters of the U.S. The existing non-wetland waters of the U.S. will be fully disturbed by grading activities with all vegetation removed.

Debris Basin 4 -Middle Canyon Drainage: Due to bulk grading and rough grading activities in preparation for pad development and road construction for the initial phase of development of Mission Village, the Permittee will clear and grade the off-site reach designated as Middle Canyon-6 to create a 23,000 cubic yard capacity debris basin which meets the County of Los Angeles Qcap (50-Year) burned and bulked flow design criteria and provide for positive flow (Attachment A, Figure 4, Plan View of Debris Basin in Middle Canyon Drainage). The existing topography at the basin location requires an average of 22 feet of fill to create the basin bottom. Onsite native soils from adjacent grading areas will be used for the fill and will be compacted using heavy equipment. Portions of the debris basin structures and perimeter berms are located within the jurisdictional area. The debris basin will include an outlet structure, concrete facing at the northern end, and an access ramp. Impacts to Middle Canyon drainage are limited to permanently filling 765 feet of the drainage, which will result in permanent impacts to 0.03 acre of non-wetland Waters of the U.S. To create this fill, approximately 3,200 cubic yards of onsite soils will be placed in the drainage to create the basin bottom grades that will allow positive flow and allow for the required debris basin capacity. The existing jurisdiction will be fully disturbed by grading activities with all vegetation removed. All of the jurisdictional impacts are considered permanent impacts.

VI. Project Impact and Receiving Waters Information

The Project is located within the jurisdiction of Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board. Receiving waters and groundwater potentially impacted by this Project are protected in accordance with the applicable water quality control plan (Basin Plan) for the region and other plans and policies which may be accessed online at:

http://www.waterboards.ca.gov/plans policies/. The Basin Plan includes water quality standards, which consist of existing and potential beneficial uses of waters of the state, water quality objectives to protect those uses, and the state and federal antidegradation policies.

It is the policy of the State of California that every human being has the right to safe, clean, affordable, and accessible water adequate for human consumption, cooking, and sanitary purposes. This Order promotes that policy by requiring discharges to meet contaminant levels designed to protect human health and ensure that water is safe for domestic use.

VII. Description of Direct Impacts to Waters of the State

Total Project fill/excavation quantities for all impacts are summarized in Table 1. Permanent impacts are categorized as those resulting in a physical loss in area and also those degrading ecological condition only.

VIII. Avoidance and Minimization

Permanent impacts to waters were limited to the minimum necessary to build the debris basins. Where possible, natural soil bottom basins have been located such that floor elevations match existing topography, resulting in only temporary impacts to waters of the U.S.

IX. Mitigation

The Permittee has agreed to provide compensatory mitigation for direct impacts, described in section XIII, H for permanent impacts.

X. California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)

On October 25, 2011, the Los Angeles County, as lead agency, certified an environmenal impact report/environmental impact statement (EIR/EIS) (State Clearinghouse (SCH) No. 2005051143) for the Project and filed a Notice of Determination (NOD) at the SCH on May 15,

2012. The Los Angeles Water Board is a responsible agency under CEQA (Pub. Resources Code, § 21069) and in making its determinations and findings, must presume that Los Angeles County's adopted environmental document comports with the requirements of CEQA and is valid. (Pub. Resources Code, § 21167.3.) Los Angeles Water Board staff commented on the draft EIR/EIS on January 4, 2011 and the comments were considered in the final EIR/EIS. The Los Angeles Water Board has reviewed and considered the environmental document and finds that the environmental document prepared by Los Angeles County adequately addresses the Project's water resource impacts. (Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, § 15096, subd. (f).)

XI. Petitions for Reconsideration

Any person aggrieved by this action may petition the State Water Board to reconsider this Order in accordance with California Code of Regulations, title 23, section 3867. A petition for reconsideration must be submitted in writing and received within 30 calendar days of the issuance of this Order.

XII. Fees Received

A fee of \$3,450 was received on February 16, 2018. The fee amount was determined as required by California Code of Regulations, title 23, sections 3833(b)(3) and 2200(a)(3), and was calculated as Fill and Excavation Discharges with the dredge and fill fee calculator.

XIII. Conditions

The Los Angeles Water Board has independently reviewed the record of the Project to analyze impacts to water quality and designated beneficial uses within the watersheds of the Project. In accordance with this Order, the Permittee may proceed with the Project under the following terms and conditions:

A. Authorization

Impacts to waters of the state shall not exceed quantities shown in Table 1.

B. Reporting and Notification Requirements

Requirements for the content of these reporting and notification types are detailed in Attachment C, including specifications for photo and map documentation during the Project. Written reports and notifications must be submitted using the Reporting and Notification Cover Sheet located in Attachment C, which must be signed by the Permittee or an authorized representative.

1. Project Reporting

a. Annual Reporting: The Permittee shall submit an Annual Report each year on the anniversary of Project effective date. Annual Reporting requirements are detailed in Attachment C. Annual reporting shall continue until a Notice of Project Complete Letter is issued to the Permittee.

2. Project Status Notifications

a. Request for Notice of Completion of Discharges Letter: The Permittee shall submit a Request for Notice of Completion of Discharges Letter following completion of active Project construction activities, including any required restoration and permittee-responsible mitigation. This request shall be submitted to the Los Angeles

Water Board staff within thirty (30) days following completion of all Project construction activities. Upon acceptance of the request, Los Angeles Water Board staff shall issue a Notice of Completion of Discharges Letter to the Permittee which will end the active discharge period and associated annual fees.

- b. Request for Notice of Project Complete Letter: The Permittee shall submit a Request for Notice of Project Complete Letter when construction and/or any post-construction monitoring is complete,³ and no further Project activities will occur. This request shall be submitted to Los Angeles Water Board staff within thirty (30) days following completion of all Project activities. Upon approval of the request, the Los Angeles Water Board staff shall issue a Notice of Project Complete Letter to the Permittee which will end the post discharge monitoring period and associated annual fees.
- **3. Conditional Notifications and Reports:** The following notifications and reports are required as appropriate.
 - a. Accidental Discharges of Hazardous Materials⁴

Following an accidental discharge of a reportable quantity of a hazardous material, sewage, or an unknown material, the following applies (Wat. Code, § 13271):

- As soon as (A) Permittee has knowledge of the discharge or noncompliance,
 (B) notification is possible, and (C) notification can be provided without substantially impeding cleanup or other emergency measures then:
 - first call 911 (to notify local response agency)
 - then call Office of Emergency Services (OES) State Warning Center at: (800) 852-7550 or (916) 845-8911
 - Lastly follow the required OES procedures as set forth in: http://www.caloes.ca.gov/FireRescueSite/Documents/CalOES-Spill Booklet Feb2014 FINAL BW Acc.pdf
- **ii.** Following notification to OES, the Permittee shall notify Los Angeles Water Board, as soon as practicable (ideally within 24 hours). Notification may be via telephone, e-mail, delivered written notice, or other verifiable means.
- iii. Within five (5) working days of notification to the Los Angeles Water Board, the Permittee must submit an Accidental Discharge of Hazardous Material Report.
- b. Violation of Compliance with Water Quality Standards: The Permittee shall notify the Los Angeles Water Board of any event causing a violation of compliance

with water quality standards. Notification may be via telephone, e-mail, delivered written notice, or other verifiable means.

- i. Examples of noncompliance events include: lack of storm water treatment following a rain event, discharges causing a visible plume in a water of the state, and water contact with uncured concrete.
- **ii.** This notification must be followed within three (3) working days by submission of a Violation of Compliance with Water Quality Standards Report.

c. In-Water Work

- i. If stream diversion will be necessary, the Permittee shall submit to the Los Angeles Water Board staff a Stream Diversion Plan, with a diagram and a narrative description of the method to divert the stream and associated BMPs for acceptance at least 30 days in advance of any stream diversion.
- ii. During stream diversion, water quality monitoring shall be conducted. Requirements for water quality monitoring are below.
- iii. The Permittee shall notify the Los Angeles Water Board at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to initiating work in water or stream diversions. Notification may be via telephone, e-mail, delivered written notice, or other verifiable means.

d. Modifications to Project

Project modifications may require an amendment of this Order. The Permittee shall give advance notice to Los Angeles Water Board staff if Project implementation as described in the application materials is altered in any way or by the imposition of subsequent permit conditions by any local, state or federal regulatory authority by submitting a Modifications to Project Report. The Permittee shall inform Los Angeles Water Board staff of any Project modifications that will interfere with the Permittee's compliance with this Order.

- **e.** Transfer of Property Ownership: This Order is not transferable in its entirety or in part to any person or organization except after notice to the Los Angeles Water Board in accordance with the following terms:
 - i. The Permittee must notify the Los Angeles Water Board of any change in ownership or interest in ownership of the Project area by submitting a Transfer of Property Ownership Report. The Permittee and purchaser must sign and date the notification and provide such notification to the Los Angeles Water Board at least 10 days prior to the transfer of ownership.
 - **ii.** Until such time as this Order has been modified to name the purchaser as the permittee, the Permittee shall continue to be responsible for all requirements set forth in this Order.

f. Transfer of Long-Term BMP Maintenance: If maintenance responsibility for post-construction BMPs such as debris basins is legally transferred, the Permittee must submit to the Los Angeles Water Board a copy of such documentation and must provide the transferee with a copy of a long-term BMP maintenance plan that complies with manufacturer or designer specifications. The Permittee must provide such notification to the Los Angeles Water Board with a Transfer of Long-Term BMP Maintenance Report at least 10 days prior to the transfer of BMP maintenance responsibility.

C. Water Quality Monitoring

- 1. **General:** If surface water is present, continuous visual surface water monitoring shall be conducted to detect accidental discharge of construction related pollutants (e.g. oil and grease, turbidity plume, or uncured concrete).
- 2. Accidental Discharges/Noncompliance: Upon occurrence of an accidental discharge of hazardous materials or a violation of compliance with a water quality standard, Los Angeles Water Board staff may require water quality monitoring based on the discharge constituents and/or related water quality objectives and beneficial uses.

3. In-Water Work or Diversions:

During planned work in water or stream diversions any discharge(s) to waters of the state shall conform to the following water quality standards:

- a. Oil and Grease. Waters shall not contain oils, greases, waxes or other materials in concentrations that result in a visible film or coating on the surface of the water or on objects in the water, that cause nuisance, or that otherwise adversely affect beneficial uses.
- **b.** Dissolved Oxygen. The dissolved oxygen content of all surface waters designated as WARM shall not be depressed below 5 mg/L as a result of waste discharges.
- c. pH. The pH of inland surface waters shall not be depressed below 6.5 or raised above 8.5 as a result of waste discharges. Ambient pH levels shall not be changed more than 0.5 units from natural conditions as a result of waste discharge.
- **d.** Turbidity. Downstream TSS shall be maintained at ambient levels. Where natural turbidity is between 0 and 50 Nephelometric Turbidity Units (NTU), increases shall not exceed 20%. Where natural turbidity is greater than 50 NTU, increases shall not exceed 10%.

Sampling shall be conducted in accordance with Table 2 sampling parameters.5

⁵ Pollutants shall be analyzed using the analytical methods described in 40 Code of Federal Regulations Part 136; where no methods are specified for a given pollutant, the method shall be approved by Los Angeles Water Board staff. Grab samples shall be taken between the surface and mid-depth and not be collected at the same time each day to get a complete representation of variations in the receiving water. A hand-held field meter may be used, provided the meter utilizes a U.S. EPA-approved algorithm/method and is calibrated and maintained in accordance (footnote continued on next page)

Baseline sampling shall be conducted at least one location within the project boundary for each phase. All other sampling shall take place at a minimum of two locations. In streams or flowing water the sample locations shall be upstream and downstream. Results of the analyses shall be submitted to this Regional Board by the 15th day of each subsequent sampling month. A map or drawing indicating the locations of sampling points shall be included with each submittal.

4. Post-Construction: Visually inspect the Project site during the rainy season for 5 years to ensure excessive erosion, stream instability, or other water quality pollution is not occurring in or downstream of the Project site. If water quality pollution is occurring, contact the Los Angeles Water Board staff member overseeing the Project within three (3) working days. The Los Angeles Water Board may require the submission of a Violation of Compliance with Water Quality Standards Report. Additional permits may be required to carry out any necessary site remediation.

D. Standard

- 1. This Order is subject to modification or revocation upon administrative or judicial review, including review and amendment pursuant to Water Code section 13330, and California Code of Regulations, title 23, chapter 28, Article 6 commencing with sections 3867-3869, inclusive. Additionally, the Los Angeles Water Board reserves the right to suspend, cancel, or modify and reissue this Order, after providing notice to the Permittee, if the Los Angeles Water Board determines that: the Project fails to comply with any of the conditions of this Order; or, when necessary to implement any new or revised water quality standards and implementation plans adopted or approved pursuant to the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act (Wat. Code, § 13000 et seq.) or federal Clean Water Act section 303 (33 U.S.C. § 1313). For purposes of Clean Water Act section 401(d), the condition constitutes a limitation necessary to assure compliance with water quality standards and appropriate requirements of state law.
- 2. This Order is not intended and shall not be construed to apply to any activity involving a hydroelectric facility requiring a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) license or an amendment to a FERC license, unless the pertinent certification application was filed pursuant to subsection 3855(b) of chapter 28, title 23 of the California Code of

with the manufacturer's instructions. A calibration and maintenance log for each meter used for monitoring shall be maintained onsite.

Regulations, and that application specifically identified that a FERC license or amendment to a FERC license for a hydroelectric facility was being sought.

- 3. This Order is conditioned upon total payment of any fee required under title 23 of the California Code of Regulations and owed by the Permittee.
- 4. In the event of any violation or threatened violation of the conditions of this Order, the violation or threatened violation shall be subject to any remedies, penalties, process, or sanctions as provided for under state and federal law. For purposes of Clean Water Act, section 401(d), the applicability of any state law authorizing remedies, penalties, processes, or sanctions for the violation or threatened violation constitutes a limitation necessary to assure compliance with the water quality standards and other pertinent requirements incorporated into this Order.

E. General Compliance

- 1. Failure to comply with any condition of this Order shall constitute a violation of the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act and the Clean Water Act. The Permittee and/or discharger may then be subject to administrative and/or civil liability pursuant to Water Code section 13385.
- 2. Permitted actions must not cause a violation of any applicable water quality standards, including impairment of designated beneficial uses for receiving waters as adopted in the Basin Plans by any applicable Los Angeles Water Board or any applicable State Water Board (collectively Water Boards) water quality control plan or policy. The source of any such discharge must be eliminated as soon as practicable.
- 3. In response to a suspected violation of any condition of this Order, the Los Angeles Water Board may require the holder of this Order to furnish, under penalty of perjury, any technical or monitoring reports the Water Boards deem appropriate, provide that the burden, including costs, of the reports shall bear a reasonable relationship to the need for the reports and the benefits to be obtained from the reports. The additional monitoring requirements ensure that permitted discharges and activities comport with any applicable effluent limitations, water quality standards, and/or other appropriate requirement of state law.
- 4. The Permittee must, at all times, fully comply with engineering plans, specifications, and technical reports submitted to support this Order; and all subsequent submittals required as part of this Order. The conditions within this Order and Attachments supersede conflicting provisions within Permittee submittals.
- 5. This Order and all of its conditions contained herein continue to have full force and effect regardless of the expiration or revocation of any federal license or permit issued for the Project. For purposes of Clean Water Act, section 401(d), this condition constitutes a limitation necessary to assure compliance with the water quality standards and other pertinent requirements of state law.
- 6. Construction General Permit Requirement: If enrolled, the Permittee shall maintain compliance with conditions described in, and required by, NPDES General Permit for Storm Water Discharges Associated with Construction and Land Disturbance Activities (Order No. 2012-0011-DWQ; NPDES No. CAS004001) (General Construction Permt).

F. Administrative

- 1. Signatory requirements for all document submittals required by this Order are presented in Attachment B of this Order.
- 2. This Order does not authorize any act which results in the taking of a threatened, endangered or candidate species or any act, which is now prohibited, or becomes prohibited in the future, under either the California Endangered Species Act (Fish & G. Code, §§ 2050-2097) or the federal Endangered Species Act (16 U.S.C. §§ 1531-1544). If a "take" will result from any act authorized under this Order held by the Permittee, the Permittee must obtain authorization for the take prior to any construction or operation of the portion of the Project that may result in a take. The Permittee is responsible for meeting all requirements of the applicable endangered species act for the Project authorized under this Order.
- 3. The Permittee shall grant Los Angeles Water Board staff, or an authorized representative (including an authorized contractor acting as a Water Board representative), upon presentation of credentials and other documents as may be required by law, permission to:
 - **a.** Enter upon the Project or compensatory mitigation site(s) premises where a regulated facility or activity is located or conducted, or where records are kept.
 - **b.** Have access to and copy any records that are kept and are relevant to the Project or the requirements of this Order.
 - **c.** Inspect any facilities, equipment (including monitoring and control equipment), practices, or operations regulated or required under this Order.
 - d. Sample or monitor for the purposes of assuring Order compliance.
- 4. A copy of this Order shall be provided to any consultants, contractors, and subcontractors working on the Project. Copies of this Order shall remain at the Project site for the duration of this Order. The Permittee shall be responsible for work conducted by its consultants, contractors, and any subcontractors.
- **5.** A copy of this Order must be available at the Project site(s) during construction for review by site personnel and agencies. All personnel performing work on the Project shall be familiar with the content of this Order and its posted location at the Project site.
- 6. Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreement The Permittee shall submit a signed copy of the Department of Fish and Wildlife's lake and streambed alteration agreement to the Los Angeles Water Board immediately upon execution and prior to any discharge to waters of the state.
- 7. This Certification shall expire **five (5) years** from date of this Certification. The Applicant shall submit a complete application at least 90 days prior to termination of this Certification if renewal is requested.

G. Best Management Practices

1. Schedule

 Work will be scheduled to occur when no water is present; therefore no diversions will be necessary.

 Work will also be scheduled to occur after nesting season where possible, or if during the nesting season, bird surveys will be conducted to ensure that there are no nests within 300 feet of the work area (500 feet for raptors).

2. Good Site Management "Housekeeping"

- During project construction, temporary erosion control measures will be installed, including stabilizing disturbed areas with blankets, channel lines, revegetating exposed areas, and placing sediment control BMPs at appropriate locations (e.g. fiber rolls, silt fence, jute slope covering, and other barriers).
- A qualified biologist, archaeologist and cultural monitors will be present to monitor initial clearing, grubbing and grading activities.

3. Storm Water

The project shall comply with the local regulations associated with the Los Angeles Water Board's Municipal Stormwater Permit issued to Los Angeles County and copermittees under NPDES No. CAS004001 and Waste Discharge Requirements Order No. R4-2012-0175.

H. Compensatory Mitigation for Permanent Impacts⁶

1. Final Compensatory Mitigation Plan The Permittee shall provide compensatory mitigation for impacts to waters of the state in accordance with Wetland/WOUS and Riparian Mitigation and Monitoring Plan (Compensatory Mitigation Plan) dated August 2014 and incorporated herein by reference. Any deviations from, or revisions to, the Wetland/WOUS and Riparian Mitigation and Monitoring Plan must be pre-approved by Los Angeles Water Board staff. The monitoring period shall continue until the Los Angeles Water Board staff determines that performance standards have been met. This may require the monitoring period to be extended.

The Permittee will mitigate the permanent impacts to waters of the U.S. associated with the debris basins, totaling 0.03 acre, at the Potrero Canyon Advance Mitigation Site (a cismontane alkaline marsh wetland creation project), which was established under Corps Permit SPL-2003-01264-A04 and Los Angles Water Board Order R4-2012-0139. The 28.8-acre Potrero Canyon mitigation site is in progress (approaching end of Year 3 of the 5-year maintenance/monitoring period). The site includes 19.3 acres of excess mitigation beyond that required by the RMDP. Compensatory mitigation will replace the combined loss of acreage, functions, and services at a minimum 1:1 ratio. To demonstrate that functions and services meet the minimum 1:1 replacement value, permanent impact and compensatory mitigation areas will be compared annually using Hybrid Assessment of Riparian Condition -Average Weighted (HARC-AW) units and/or similar Corps-approved method. The mitigation site will also be evaluated for CRAM, at completion. As shown in the Year 2 annual mitigation monitoring report, the Potrero

⁶ Compensatory Mitigation is for permanent physical loss and permanent ecological degradation of a water of the state.

Canyon mitigation site HARC scores as of the report period are already above those of the impacted drainages.

2. Permittee-Responsible Compensatory Mitigation Responsibility

- **a.** Permittee responsible compensatory mitigation installation shall be completed in advance of authorized impacts.
- **b.** The Permittee is responsible for the required compensatory mitigation in perpetuity. However, the Permittee may transfer the compensatory mitigation requirements associated with long-term management when the following conditions have been met:
 - i. Performance standards are met.
 - A Transfer Agreement to a third party has been approved by Los Angeles Water Board staff.
 - **iii.** An endowment fund has been provided by the Permittee to a third party for management in perpetuity of the mitigation site.
 - iv. A conservation easement, deed restriction, or other appropriate restrictive covenant for the mitigation site has been recorded and approved by Los Angeles Water Board staff.

3. Total Required Compensatory Mitigation

- a. The Permittee is required to provide compensatory mitigation for the authorized permanent impact to stream channel by establishment of wetland marsh at a minimum 5:1 area replacement ratio (1.3 acres).
- **b.** Total required Project compensatory mitigation information for permanent physical loss of area, ecological degradation and temporal loss is summarized in Table 4.




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

Cross-Section of Proposed Debris Basin in Magic Mountain Canyon Drainage






Figure 03 FivePoint Date: February 2018





- 2. Request for Notice of Completion of Discharges Letter: This request by the Permittee to the Los Angeles Water Board staff pertains to projects that have post construction monitoring requirements, e.g. if site restoration was required to be monitored for 5 years following construction. Los Angeles Water Board staff will review the request and send a Completion of Discharges Letter to the Permittee upon approval.
