Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program Update

The following information is to update the Board regarding implementation of Agricultural Order No. R3-2012-0011.

ILRP Activities at a Glance

- ILRP staff is assessing data received for the October 1, 2014 update and associated requirements. We are planning to share findings of our assessments with the Central Coast Water Board and public as informational items at upcoming Central Coast Water Board meetings.
- ILRP staff received several calls from concerned citizens during the rain events of early December 2014. The callers informed staff about discharges off agricultural lands that carried water and sediment to adjacent private property or public roads. In some cases, the discharge was likely exacerbated by the use of plastic on fields or hoop-houses, particularly in hilly areas. Staff is currently assessing our role in further tracking the potential for increased runoff from the use of plastic.

- At the time of this report preparation, ILRP staff is preparing to send Notice of Violations to growers who failed to submit information required on October 1, 2014. Our current assessment of compliance is centered on total nitrogen applied reporting and annual compliance form/eNOI updates.
- Central Coast Water Quality Preservation, Inc. (Preservation Inc.) sent participants the 2015 invoice on December 19, 2014. The invoice was accompanied by a newsletter informing growers that the participation fees for 2015 are 33% less than 2014.

Items for Discretionary Review by the Regional Board

The Agricultural Order identifies discretionary actions by the Executive Officer that are subject to review by the Regional Board. Staff updates the list quarterly and posts it at the <u>Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program</u> section of our website. We inform interested parties of the updated list through an email list serve called Lyris. We notified interested parties on December 12, 2014 of the updated list. Discretionary Review items include the following:

- o Provision 11 Approval or denial of a third-party project or program.
 - No new project or program to report.
- Part 2 of the MRP Approval or denial of a cooperative groundwater monitoring programs.
 - Staff has posted modifications of the Central Coast Groundwater Coalition (CCGC) workplan at the website link provided above.
 - See discussion related to CCGC below.
- Provision 18 Approval of a farm to transfer to a lower tier, or requirement of a farm to transfer to a higher tier.
 - Staff has posted tier transfer requests at the website link provided above.

Cooperative Groundwater Monitoring - Central Coast Groundwater Coalition

- Staff continues to coordinate closely with the Central Coast Groundwater Coalition (CCGC) to implement cooperative groundwater monitoring program requirements. Staff met with CCGC for the regular cooperative groundwater monitoring program coordination meeting on Oct. 14, 2015, in Salinas and also met on Nov. 17, Dec. 9 and Dec. 19 to discuss CCGC contour maps of nitrate concentrations in groundwater.
- Agricultural Order R3-2012-0011 and State Board Order WQ 2013-0101 require growers to notify drinking water well users if groundwater monitoring results indicates that the well exceeds drinking water standards. At the Central Coast Water Board meetings on July 31, 2014 and Nov. 13, 2014, the Central Coast Water Board heard staff's evaluation and recommended path forward concerning CCGC's process for sharing drinking water notification information that will allow the Central Coast Water Board staff to verify such notification (Items 13 and 15, respectively). During the Nov. 13, 2014 Board meeting Item 15 discussion, Board Members provided general feedback and suggested modifications to staff's conclusion that CCGC must submit additional information in order to ensure that the Central Coast Water Board can effectively verify proper drinking water notification and conduct necessary follow-up.

As a result, the Executive Officer issued a letter to CCGC on Dec. 8, 2014, requiring the CCGC to provide a relational key to the Central Coast Water Board. The relational key must include the CCGC Member ranch-specific Global ID and the associated CCGC

Field Point Name (individual well identification) for all groundwater wells sampled by the CCGC in compliance with the Agricultural Order. CCGC submitted this information to the Central Coast Water Board on December 5, 2014.

Additionally, the Executive Officer's letter also required the CCGC to ensure that well users receive a written drinking water notification of drinking water exceedances (verbal notifications are not acceptable) and also required CCGC to provide a Final Exceedance Notification Follow-Up Report to the Central Coast Water Board that comprehensively identifies all wells sampled by the CCGC with exceedances of the drinking water standard, and must include the notification date, the manner of notification, and any follow-up action to ensure safe drinking water, etc. CCGC must also conduct annual follow-up to ensure that users continue to be properly notified of drinking water.

Finally, the Executive Officer confirmed that CCGC must only submit copies of drinking water notification letters upon request, but CCGC representatives must bring copies of all drinking water notification letters to the quarterly CCGC/Water Board Coordination meetings for inspection by staff. The effect of these requirements is that the Regional Water Board will have sufficient information from CCGC regarding drinking water notifications such that the CCGC notification process is functionally equivalent to the process used by individual growers.

 At the Central Coast Water Board meetings on July 31, 2014 and Nov. 13, 2014, the Central Coast Water Board also reviewed a California Rural Legal Assistance (CRLA) request for discretionary review of the CCGC drinking water notification process. In response to CRLA's request for discretionary review, staff evaluated CRLA's specific concerns regarding written confirmation of notification and the identification of particular wells that have a nitrate exceedance. With the above-described modifications to the CCGC notification process, staff concluded that the CCGC drinking water notification process is functionally equivalent to the Central Coast Water Board's drinking water notification process, which should address CRLA's concern that the process be equivalent to the notification process for individual growers.
