

Famosa Slough

The Slough was the southern tip of Mission Bay until 1950s

37 acres overall

Has muted tidal flushing via San Diego River

Immediate watershed is about 300 acres

Also receives floodwater from San Diego River watershed during storms


Full range of coastal wetland vegetation

Over 180 species of birds

Managed by the City of SD Park and Rec


T-sheet of Mission Bay, 1860s

Famosa Slough Status

- Acquired by the City of San Diego as a wetlands preserve in 1990
- Managed by the SD City Park & Recreation Department
- Is part of City's Multiple Habitats Preserve Area under its MSCP
- Is a Marine Conservation Area (no-take) under CA's MLPA
- TMDL for eutrophication
- Restoration guided by Famosa Slough Enhancement Plan, adopted by City in 1993, funded by CA Coastal Conservancy

Bird use

- Year round habitat for some birds
- Stopover site in spring and fall during migrations
- Winter habitat for many shorebirds and ducks
- Nesting habitat during spring and summer
- Occasional rarity (vagrants)



Friends' Central and South Properties

Purchased July 2014

CA Environmental Enhancement and Mitigation Fund – Resources Agency

7 lots, 0.67 acres



West Point Loma Blvd. Restoration Project

- Managed by Friends of Famosa Slough with permission from the City of San Diego
- Construction from September to December, 2005
- Design and Construction by Merkel & Associates, Inc. under contract with FFS
- Additional plants and planting contributed by RECON
- Restoration is on-going by FFS

West Point Loma Blvd. Restoration Project

Benefits:

Increase wetland area by 2.2 acres

Improve water quality and fish habitat value with better tidal flow to east side of slough

Nesting island above high tides

Vegetate 1 acre of upland

ADA trail for visitors

West Point Loma Blvd. Restoration Project

Resources:

US Fish and Wildlife Service: \$ 68,000

Proposition 13: \$ 367,000

Friends of Famosa Slough: \$ 67,000

TOTAL \$502,000

Friends of Famosa Slough in kind contribution: Project management, watering, replanting, & invasive removal



East Bank Sediment Basin and Marsh Restoration, 2003




- Removed sediments that had buried about 0.4 acres of saltmarsh
- Constructed a small sediment basin and access
- Intercepts runoff from about 50 acres
- Mitigation for Adobe Falls sewer spill
- Dudek did design and upland revegetation
- FFS did the wetland revegetation, David Kimball

Valeta Street Treatment Ponds




Valeta Street Treatment Ponds

- Funded by Clean Water Act 319(H) Grant of \$180,000 administered by Regional Board
- Construction completed 2000
- Intercepts runoff from ~100 acres of watershed
- Design and construction managed by City of San Diego
- Project Design Inc. designed pro-bono
- Merkel and Associates was biology and construction contractor
- FFS did grant application, revegetation, and post-construction care with Park Department




Moveable Flap Gates between Famosa Slough and San Diego River Constructed 1992?
