REGIONAL WATER QUALITY CONTROL BOARD - SAN FRANCISCO BAY BOARD MEETING MINUTES

September 10, 2008

Item 1 – Roll Call and Introductions

The meeting was called to order on September 10, 2008 at 9:09 a.m. in the State Office Building Auditorium, First Floor, 1515 Clay Street, Oakland.

Board members present: John Muller, Chair; Terry Young, Vice-Chair; Shalom Eliahu; James McGrath; Steven Moore; Rameshwar Singh.

Board members absent: William Peacock.

Item 2 – Public Forum

Roger James, speaking on his own behalf, said marine animals may be harmed as a result of ingesting ocean debris. He said most ocean debris originates from land based sources. He recommended action be taken to reduce the amount of debris that enters Bay Area creeks and is transported to the Pacific Ocean.

Mr. James discussed the importance of developing and maintaining stormwater management practices.

Jen Jackson, Community Affairs Representative, East Bay Municipal Utility District, discussed the No Drugs Down the Drain campaign. She said the campaign is directed at educating residents about harm that may result when medications are disposed of down drains and at providing information on alternative disposal options.

Item 3 – Minutes of the April 9, 2008 Board Meeting

Motion: It was moved by Mr. McGrath, and it was seconded, and unanimously voted to adopt the minutes of the April 9, 2008 Board meeting.

Item 4 - Chairman's, Board Members', and Executive Officer's Reports

Terry Young said she met recently with Gary Wolff, State Board member and liaison to Region 2. She said they had a general discussion about ways to protect water quality.

Bruce Wolfe said on August 22, 2008 U.S. Environmental Protection Agency honored John Muller and his wife with the Presidential Volunteer Service Award for their commitment to implementing sustainable urban agricultural practices.

Mr. Muller thanked Mr. Wolfe for his comments and said he felt privileged to receive the Award.

Rameshwar Singh and Dr. Young congratulated Mr. Muller for being honored with the Award.

Item 5 – <u>2008 Dr. Teng-chung Wu Pollution Prevention Award</u> – Presentation of Award in Recognition of Exceptional Accomplishments in Pollution Prevention in the San Francisco Bay Area

Heather Ottaway said the Dr. Teng-chung Wu Pollution Prevention Award honors the late Dr. Wu's dedication to improving water quality through pollution prevention. She said pollution prevention involves reducing pollutants at their source rather than reducing pollutant levels through wastewater treatment processes.

Ms. Ottaway announced the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission was the recipient of the 2008 Award for their very successful SFGreasecycle program.

Ms. Ottaway recognized Central Contra Costa Sanitary District for developing an outstanding mercury reduction program. She recognized Central Contra Costa Sanitary District and Mt. View Sanitary District for developing a household hazardous waste and pharmaceutical disposal program.

Karri Ving, Biofuel Coordinator, San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, thanked the Board for the honor of receiving the 2008 Award. She said SFGreasecycle provides a free service to restaurants by collecting waste cooking oil. She said the program helps keep cooking oil from being placed down drains and clogging the sanitary collection system.

Ms. Ving said in developing the program, Public Utilities Commission staff realized cooking oil could be used as a resource and recycled into biofuel to fuel the City fleet. She recognized program staff David Silvestri and Joshua Mire for their outstanding work. She described efforts to expand the program to include residential households and to include collection of brown grease.

Mr. McGrath, Mr. Moore, and Dr. Singh commended the Commission for developing a program to convert a product perceived to be a waste into a resource.

Mr. Muller presented a Certificate to Ms. Ving commending the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission for outstanding innovation in pollution prevention exhibited through development and implementation of the SFGreasecycle program.

Mr. Wolfe said staff distributed a Supplemental to Item 6A.

Mr. Wolfe recommended adoption of the Uncontested Items including the Supplemental to Item 6A.
