The Ludwigia problem is growing downstream in the main stem of the river as well. Each year new patches form. Each year the patches grow. This must be done to stop the river from choking on Ludwigia.

Arundo donax, an amazing 30 foot tall grass and fire hazard, is increasingly evident up and down the river. Also there is a huge problem with Pepperweed in the upper watershed. Something bad has happened to the chemistry of the water so that it now encourages growth of various noxious weeds.

The river is the recipient of huge amounts of treated wastewater. This must be stopped because nutrients in wastewater contribute to the problems. Places in the watershed have concentrations of nitrogen and phosphorus that are contributing to the noxious weed problems. I recommend that you continue to list the river and its tributaries for nitrogen and phosphorus. We are losing our native plants and habitats for wildlife because of conversion to weeds.

Please forward my letter and concerns to the appropriate people and keep me informed about this issue.
