HMIS as a Comparison

- Labor intensive
 - Large number of chemicals at a typical site
 - Multiple fire codes for every chemical
- Duplication of effort
 - Industry looks up data
 - Regulators check data
- No single source for classification resulting in inconsistencies
- Separate systems for each requirement
 - Building permits
 - Emergency response plans



Benefits to Industry

- Leveraging
 - Data entered in the system once
- Consistency
 - Single interpretation between and within agencies
- Electronic submittal
- Electronic storage
 - Easy to update in subsequent years
- Efficiency
- Visibility of fire code limits
 - Drill down to "problem" areas



Industry Concerns

- Ability to use local systems
- Easy upload/download capability
- Security of data
- Accessibility by third parties



Implementation Challenges

- Systems are currently voluntary
- Industry does not want to use the system until the regulators adopt it
- Regulators reluctant to promote the system until industry starts using it
