HEARING ON THE MATTER OF CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF WATER RESOURCES AND UNITED STATES BUREAU OF RECLAMATION REQUEST FOR A CHANGE IN POINT OF DIVERSION FOR CALIFORNIA WATER FIX. OPENING STATEMENT OF SACRAMENTO COUNTY REGIONAL SANITATION DISTRICT

Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District (Regional San) owns and operates the Sacramento Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant (SRWTP). The SRWTP receives and treats wastewater from businesses and a population of approximately 1.4 million people in the urban Sacramento County region and City of West Sacramento and discharges treated effluent to the Sacrament River at Freeport, just upstream of the proposed North Delta Diversions.

Under applicable law, Regional San may obtain permits to divert and beneficially use water from the Sacramento River or Delta based on the amounts of water that it has discharged to the Sacramento River, or cease discharges and directly reuse the recycled water it produces, or dedicate its recycled water to instream purposes under Water Code section 1212. In furtherance of state policy promoting the use of recycled water,

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Regional San is actively engaged in water recycling. Regional San has filed its Protest of the proposed water rights change petition to ensure that the proposed changes will not injure Regional San's substantial rights and interests in the use of its recycled water.

Regional San currently provides approximately 3.5 million gallons per day (mgd) of recycled water for beneficial reuse, with authority to provide up to 10 mgd. Regional San is planning for a substantial increase in recycled water services in conjunction with its EchoWater Project, a \$2 billion investment that will provide disinfected tertiary treated effluent suitable for recycling and reuse for a broad range of purpose. Among the projects the highly treated effluent will support is Regional San's South County Agriculture & Habitat Lands Recycled Water Program (South County Ag Project), which will deliver up to 50,000 acre-feet per year of recycled water to approximately 16,000 acres of irrigated land and wildlife habitat in southern Sacramento County. This project has broad stakeholder support. It will advance state recycling goals and provide important benefits related to regional water reliability, reduce burdens on groundwater resources for irrigation, raise groundwater levels, improve Cosumnes River flow and fishery conditions, and provide water for wetland resources.

Approval of the California WaterFix Petition could impair Regional San's rights to the recycled water that it discharges. To the extent the California WaterFix Petition assumes that Regional San's treated effluent will continue to be discharged to the Sacramento River, or that treated effluent will be available to meet obligations, standards, or objectives that are directly or indirectly related to flow, that assumption is incorrect; any action based on the assumption could injure Regional San, a legal user of water under its superior rights to its wastewater discharges, and would be contrary to law and the public interest. Petitioners' case-in-chief makes no mention of Regional San's current or future discharge, nor does it contain any information about the assumptions Petitioners may have made regarding continued discharge by Regional San, if any. Accordingly, Petitioners have failed to demonstrate that the Petition will not injure Regional San as a legal user of water.

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In Part 1 of this proceeding, Regional San seeks assurances that will preclude Petitioners from asserting that treated effluent from the SRWTP is available for appropriation or diversion by Petitioners or that Regional San can be required to discharge treated effluent or ensure flow to provide water for diversion by Petitioner or other parties, or to meet standards, objectives, or criteria that are directly or indirectly related to requirements associated with the California WaterFix project. Regional San respectfully requests that the State Water Resources Control Board deny the proposed Petition unless Regional San's right and interests in its recycled water are fully protected.
