SUBJECT OF WORKSHOP

The State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) staff is convening a staff workshop to discuss the draft Policy for Maintaining Instream Flows in Northern California Coastal Streams (draft policy) that was released by the State Water Board on December 28, 2007. At this workshop, State Water Board staff will explain the technical basis of the draft policy, and will describe how the draft policy and guidelines could be applied to water right projects if the draft policy is adopted.

BACKGROUND


Water Code section 1259.4, which was added by Assembly Bill 2121 (Stats. 2004, ch. 943, § 3), requires the State Water Board to adopt principles and guidelines for maintaining instream flows in northern California coastal streams as part of state policy for water quality control, for the purposes of water right administration. On December 28, 2007, the State Water Board released a Notice of Availability of a draft policy that implements Water Code section 1259.4. The draft policy would apply to applications to appropriate water, small domestic use and livestock stockpond registrations, and water right petitions. The geographic scope of the draft policy encompasses coastal streams from the Mattole River to San Francisco and coastal streams entering northern San Pablo Bay, and extends to five counties -- Marin, Sonoma, and portions of Napa, Mendocino, and Humboldt counties.

The draft policy establishes principles and guidelines for maintaining instream flows for the protection of fishery resources. It prescribes protective measures regarding the season of diversion, minimum bypass flow, and maximum cumulative diversion. The draft policy contains guidelines and methodology for evaluating whether a proposed water diversion, in combination with existing diversions in a watershed, may affect instream flows needed for the protection of fishery resources.

MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION IN THE WORKSHOP

State Water Board staff will provide information on how the draft policy may affect pending water rights and explain the implementation of the draft policy's methodologies. State Water Board staff will also respond to technical questions related to the draft policy.
