MR. FISCH: Alright. Well, I think we can get started today. Let some folks trickle in. So, yeah, good afternoon, everyone. My name is Nathan Fisch. I'm a Senior Environmental Scientist with the State Water Board in the Division of Water Rights. Welcome and thank you for taking the time out of your day to join us for this public meeting.

This public meeting is to provide an opportunity for feedback on the Notice of Preparation of an Environmental Impact Report for relicensing of the Kerckhoff Hydroelectric Project.

And just a note that this meeting is being recorded.

So we have some folks joining us from the State Water Board team. We have Parker Thaler, our Environmental Program Manager. We have Garrett Lenahan, our OCC Attorney, Michael Aoun, who is assisting, and then Andrea Sellers, who is the Project Manager for this.

So in a moment here, Andrea Sellers is going to go through some slides on some background rules for today's meeting, a bit about the State Water Board, what our role is in relicensing, and then briefly go over the proposed

project from PG&E. 1 2 After that, we're going to open it up for public 3 We're excited to be here and to hear everyone. comment. 4 We're particularly interested in hearing if folks have 5 concerns with the project or if they have any particular 6 alternatives they think should be analyzed. But any 7 comment is welcome. 8 This is the second of two meetings. We held one 9 earlier this afternoon. So if you do not feel comfortable providing comment today, we're accepting written comments 10 11 until July 3rd. 12 And with that, I think that's everything I wanted 13 to say. We can hand it over to Andrea. 14 MS. SELLERS: Thanks, Nathan. Give me one second 15 so I can share my screen, get this all set up. Can you 16 guys see that Okay? 17 MR. FISCH: Yes. 18 MS. SELLERS: Okay. Perfect. Alright. 19 Hello, everyone. My name is Andrea Sellers and I 20 work for the State Water Resources Control Board in the 21 Division of Water Rights. I'm an Environmental Scientist 22 and the Project Manager for the Kerckhoff Hydroelectric 23 Projects. And today I will be presenting for the scoping 24 meeting.

Please note that this meeting is being recorded.

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So thank you for joining our virtual meeting. Before we begin, I'd like to discuss some logistics and quidelines for this meeting.

First, for the duration of this meeting, please remain on mute and keep your videos off to minimize background noise and distractions.

This meeting is being recorded by a court reporter who will provide a transcript of the meeting that will be posted to the project webpage, so you don't have to worry about writing everything down from these slides. The site URL address can be seen on the current slide where the transcripts will be posted.

Lastly, please save all comments until the presentation during the verbal comment period.

So today I plan to provide a very brief overview of the Kerckhoff Hydroelectric Project, and then I'll discuss some background and information about the State Water Board, talk about why we're here.

I will then discuss the water quality certification process and the California Environmental Quality Act, or also called CEQA process, and then I'll talk about how the public can provide input. I will then talk about our next steps and what to expect for the CEQA process.

We will then open up the floor to receive verbal

comments from any meeting participants that are virtually present with us today.

So now onto the Kerckhoff Project overview.

So the Kerckhoff Project is owned and operated by the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, also known as PG&E. Kerckhoff is located on the San Joaquin River in two counties, that's Fresno and Madera counties. The nearest city to the project is Auberry, California, which is located approximately four miles northeast of the Kerckhoff Dam.

The existing project consists of Kerckhoff Dam,
Kerckhoff Reservoir, the Kerckhoff One Powerhouse, the
Kerckhoff Two Powerhouse, which are often referred to as
the K1 and K2 Powerhouses, and the Smalley Cove Recreation
Area.

Water passing through the K1 and K2 Powerhouses flows into the San Joaquin River and subsequently flows into Millerton Lake. Millerton Lake is a non-project reservoir.

Continuing on with the Kerckhoff overview, I'll now discuss the proposed project.

So PG&E is requesting to relicense the Kerckhoff Hydroelectric Project with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, also called FERC, for a 50-year term. The proposed project involves continued operations with the

following changes: proposed boundary updates which includes an overall reduction of the FERC boundary, proposed updates to project facilities which includes the retirement of the K1 powerhouse and its associated facilities, which will be left in place, the construction of a new recreation facility called the Vista Day Use Area, and the installation of a new stream flow gauge, which will be located on the San Joaquin River above the Kerckhoff Reservoir. Also, 16 proposed plans and measures, which will be shown on the next slide.

So here are the 16 proposed plans and measures for the new license term. I will not be going into each plan and measure in detail today, but if you would like more information regarding each plan and measure, please see the Notice of Preparation we issued on May 30th, 2023. The Notice of Preparation can be found on the State Water Board's Kerckhoff Hydroelectric Project webpage. The project webpage address is shown at the end of this presentation.

So now I'd like to discuss the background of the State Water Board and talk a little bit about why we're here.

So the State Water Board has authority over water rights and water quality to protect California's water.

The State Water Board protects and enforces many water

uses, including the needs of industry, agriculture, hydropower, municipal districts, and the environment. It must also protect the various beneficial uses of water.

So why is the State Water Board involved? We are here today because in California, Section 401 of the Clean Water Act requires that any applicant seeking a federal license or permit for a proposed that activity may result in a discharge to surface water is required to obtain a water quality certification from the State Water Board. The State Water Board conditions hydroelectric projects via a water quality certification to ensure the protection of the state's waters.

PG&E is expected to submit an application for a water quality certification to the State Water Board for its review. We'll discuss the water quality cert process more on the following slide.

So in November of 2020, the applicant, in this case PG&E, filed its final license application with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, or FERC, for the Kerckhoff Hydroelectric Project. The project is also referred to as FERC Project Number 96.

PG&E filed two supplemental final license applications, one on May 26th, 2022, and the other on March 31st, 2023. Those included the additional protection mitigation and enhancement measures that we saw previously.

So now I'm going to discuss the water quality certification and how it's related to the federal license.

So water quality certifications focus on protecting water quality, protecting beneficial uses of water, and considering the existing water rights. If a water quality certification is issued, the conditions in it become a mandatory part of the FERC license for the project. Water quality certifications ensure that a project will adhere to water quality objectives and beneficial uses as outlined in the Regional Water Quality Control Plans, also called Basin Plans.

Before the State Water Board can issue a water quality certification, it must first comply with the California Environmental Quality Act, which is also called CEQA. So as I just mentioned, we cannot issue a water quality certification without first completing CEQA. What CEQA does is that it informs the State Water Board and the public about the project's potentially significant impacts and ways to reduce those impacts. A CEQA document will be used to support the conditions on the water quality certification.

Today's meeting is meant to solicit public input that can inform the development of the State Water Board CEQA document. As PG&E is not a public agency, the State Water Board will be the lead agency for CEQA and will

prepare the CEQA document. In this case, the State Water Board will be preparing a type of CEQA document called an Environmental Impact Report, which is also referred to as an EIR.

So now I'm going to talk about the CEQA process.

Shown here is an overview of a typical CEQA process in which the State Water Board is the lead agency and it is also determined that an EIR is necessary. So step one, the State Water Board determines if an environmental impact report is necessary, which we have.

Next, the State Water Board will issue a Notice of Preparation, also called the NOP, and we'll conduct scoping meetings for public input. This is the step we're currently on.

Then the State Water Board will collect written and verbal comments during the scoping period and prepare a draft EIR. The State Water Board will then issue the draft EIR for public comment.

After the public comment period concludes, the State Water Board will review and respond to any public comment that was received. The State Water Board will then issue the final EIR for the project.

So CEQA also helps us to identify which potentially significant impacts the project may have. In this case, and during the scoping process, the State Water

Board expects that a number of potentially significant impacts may occur as a result of the proposed project.

The resources on this slide are part of a preliminary and non-exhaustive list that would be potentially significantly impacted by the project. A few of the main resources that may be impacted include biological resources, hydrology, water quality, recreation, and greenhouse gasses.

So now we're going to talk about the types of comments and input that we're looking for during the scoping period. We consider all comments helpful, but there are a few key pieces of information that would be most helpful to us for the development of the EIR.

We plan to evaluate PG&E's proposed project and a range of alternatives. Input on specific project alternatives would be helpful. Other comments regarding potential impacts of the project and potential mitigation measures to lessen those impacts would be helpful as well. All public comments should be submitted by July 3rd, 2023, and they will all be considered.

After the draft EIR is released, there will be another public review and comment period to solicit input on the document. And although it's not required, the State Water Board plans to issue a draft water quality certification, which will also be available for public

comment.

So how to stay informed and up to date with the project. The State Water Board will continue to update the Kerckhoff Hydroelectric Project webpage with information and filings regarding the CEQA and water quality certification process. The site URL for the Kerckhoff Hydroelectric Project is seen on the current slide right here.

On that webpage, you can find the Notice of Preparation that we issued on May 30th. The Notice of Preparation has information on how to subscribe for a notification system called GovDeliver. If you sign up for GovDeliver, we'll send you emails related to the Kerckhoff Hydroelectric Project and other projects that are pursuing certifications that are managed by our division.

Okay, now we're going to move on and open up the floor to receive verbal comments. If you'd like to make a comment, please use the raise-hand feature to let us know. We will be unmuting commenters in the order that we see the hands are raised. Also, to help us and the court reporter out, please state your affiliation and spell your name. For those of you on the phone without the ability to use the raise hand feature, please send us an email and or letter to the address listed in the last slide.

Let's start with some ground rules.

First, please be respectful to attendees and please don't single anybody out. All comments are welcome and will be included in the record as long as they are not discriminatory or scathing in nature.

As this is a public meeting, we apologize in advance of unexpected things happen. We'll do our best to keep everything productive and respectful from the host side of things.

Please speak clearly for the court reporter and everyone else who's attending today. Since we expect multiple people to give comments, we would expect you to please keep your comments to the allotted time, which I will be three to five minutes.

So, yeah, I can't see the hands being raised, so please let me know if anyone has their hand raised.

MR. AOUN: No hands right now.

MS. SELLERS: Okay. Great.

And maybe while we wait for people to raise their hands, I'll just go over the last slide really quick. I'm so sorry.

Okay, so we're accepting written comments until 5:00 p.m. on July 3rd, 2023 regarding the range of alternatives, potentially potential significant effects, and mitigation measures. Please note that there was an error in the newspaper posting that had the incorrect date

1 for the conclusion of the comment period. The correct date 2 is July 3rd, 2023. Directions on how to submit comments by 3 email or hard copy are shown on the current slide. 4 Has anyone raised their hand? 5 MR.
