§ 401 Water Quality Certification, Condition 13: Request for Temporary

Cessation of Flushing Flows in 2019

Dear Mr. Ekdahl:

Pacific Gas and Electric Company's (PG&E) Pit 1 Hydroelectric Project<sup>1</sup> License (Federal Energy Regulatory Commission [FERC] Project No. 2687) includes a California State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) §401 Water Quality Certification (Certification). Condition 13 of the Certification requires PG&E to release flushing flows to control nuisance aquatic vegetation and mosquito production in Fall River Pond.

On May 26, 2009, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) sent a letter to FERC and the State Water Board expressing concern regarding a decline in the federally and state-endangered Shasta crayfish (*Pacifastacus fortis*). That letter requested suspension of summer flushing flows at PG&E's Pit 1 Project.

On August 28, 2009, the State Water Board sent a letter to PG&E indicating that amending the License was a discretionary action that required the State Water Board to comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

The State Water Board issued Orders in 2010<sup>2</sup>, 2012<sup>3</sup>, 2013<sup>4</sup>, 2014<sup>5</sup>, 2015<sup>6</sup>, 2016<sup>7</sup>, 2017<sup>8</sup>, and 2018<sup>9</sup> that temporarily suspended these flushing flows from 2010 through 2018, while a CEQA

process is implemented to analyze the effects of permanently suspending the flushing flow requirements. FERC, in turn, issued Orders in 2010<sup>10</sup>, 2012<sup>11</sup> and 2013<sup>12</sup> temporarily amending the Pit 1 license to suspend flushing flows. FERC issued Orders modifying and approving temporary flow variances in 2014<sup>13</sup> and 2015<sup>14</sup>. FERC also issued Orders approving a temporary flow variance in 2016<sup>15</sup>, 2017<sup>16</sup>, and 2018<sup>17</sup>.

In a February 4, 2019 letter to the USFWS, PG&E requested informal Section 7 consultation for a temporary suspension of the flushing flow requirement in 2019. This letter requested concurrence with the determination that the temporary suspension of the requirement is not likely to adversely affect Shasta crayfish. Based on USFWS's request to permanently suspend the flushing flows in 2009, and their annual concurrence since that time that temporarily suspending flows will not likely adversely affect Shasta Crayfish, PG&E anticipates obtaining concurrence from USFWS to temporarily suspend flushing flows in 2019.

In order to ensure timely approval by the State Water Board, PG&E respectfully requests a one-year extension, in 2019, of the suspension of flushing flows required by Certification Condition 13. The proposed suspension is to facilitate completion of the CEQA analysis. In a subsequent letter, PG&E will file the concurrence letter from USFWS once it has been obtained.

Informal Section 7 Consultation for the Temporary Suspension of the

Flushing Flow Requirement in 2019

Dear Mr. Olah:

Pacific Gas and Electric Company's (PG&E) Pit 1 Hydroelectric Project license<sup>1</sup> (Federal Energy Regulatory Commission [FERC] Project No. 2687) includes a California State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) Clean Water Act §401 Water Quality Certification (Certification). Condition No. 13 of the Certification requires PG&E to release flushing flows during the summer months to control nuisance aquatic vegetation and mosquito production in Fall River Pond.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife (Service) determined, as stated in letters dated May 26, 2009 and December 17, 2009, that flushing flow releases are adversely affecting federally endangered Shasta crayfish (*Pacifastacus fortis*), and requested FERC temporarily cease the summer flushing flow releases.

The State Water Board issued orders in 2010<sup>2</sup>, 2012<sup>3</sup>, 2013<sup>4</sup>, 2014<sup>5</sup>, 2015<sup>6</sup>, 2016<sup>7</sup>, 2017<sup>8</sup>, and 2018<sup>9</sup> that temporarily suspended these flushing flows in 2010 through 2018, while a California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) process is implemented to analyze the

effects of permanently suspending the flushing flow requirements. FERC, in turn, issued Orders in 2010<sup>10</sup>, 2012<sup>11</sup>, and 2013<sup>12</sup> temporarily amending the Pit 1 Project license to suspend flushing flows. FERC issued Orders modifying and approving temporary flow variances in 2014<sup>13</sup> and 2015<sup>14</sup>. FERC also issued Orders approving temporary flow variances in 2016<sup>15</sup>, 2017<sup>16</sup>, and 2018<sup>17</sup>.

In a December 9, 2009 letter, FERC informed the Service that FERC has designated PG&E to act as their non-federal representative for the purpose of informal consultation with the Service, pursuant to Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act (ESA) for the Pit No. 1 Hydroelectric Project.

This letter is a request for informal Section 7 consultation for a temporary suspension of the flushing flow requirement in 2019. PG&E requests concurrence with the determination that the temporary suspension of the flushing flow requirement in 2019 is not likely to adversely affect the federally endangered Shasta crayfish. The proposed suspension is to facilitate completion of the Service's Section 7 ESA consultation and the State Water Board's CEQA analysis.

The Service provided a "not likely to adversely affect" concurrence to FERC on May 3, 2010 for temporary suspension of the flushing flows in 2010 and 2011. The Service also provided "not likely to affect" concurrence for the temporary suspension of flushing flows in 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, and 2018 per letters dated July 19, 2012; May 16, 2013; April 18, 2014; March 19, 2015; June 9, 2016; June 13, 2017; and March 26, 2018 respectively.

The best available science to date has shown the flushing flows create detrimental effects to this species' habitat and potentially create a favorable environment for non-native crayfish. Temporary suspension of the flushing flows would likely preserve coldwater habitat used by the Shasta crayfish. Therefore, we conclude that the proposed action, to add another year to the temporary suspension of flushing flows, is not likely to adversely affect Shasta crayfish or its habitat.

PG&E will request from the State Water Board Deputy Director an extension of the cessation of flushing flows for 2019. After the State Water Board issues its Order, PG&E will file a request with FERC to temporarily amend Condition No. 13 of the Appendix to the
